SPECIAL PROVISION CAPITAL FUNDING

1. Purpose of report

- **1.1** The purpose of this report is to:
 - Give an update on year 1 Special Provision Capital Funding (SPCF) work
 - Set out proposals for use of the SPCF in years 2 and 3 (2019 -2021)
 - Outline next steps in respect of the SPCF.
 - Seek Executive Members approval to consult on proposals.

2. Background

- **2.1** The LA has a statutory responsibility under the Children and Families Act 2014 to keep its special educational provision under review, to ensure sufficiency in placements to meet the needs of children and young people with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND), working with parents/carers, young people and providers.
- 2.2 In 2017 DfE committed £215 million as a Special Provision Capital Fund (SPCF) to further develop capacity and improve facilities in provision for children and young people with Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs). North Yorkshire was initially allocated a total of £500,000 over three years from 2018/19 to 2020/21. In 2018 DfE committed a further £50 million to the SPCF, which was allocated to local authorities using the same formula. North Yorkshire will therefore receive a further £116 279 in years 2 and 3 of the funding, meaning the total from 2018 to 2021 is £616 279.
- **2.3** North Yorkshire received the first tranche of funding in August 2018, following consultation and publication of the SPCF plan in line with DfE requirements. In order to receive future years' funding there must be further consultation, and the LA's plan must be updated and republished. The next deadline for this is 29th March 2019.
- **2.4** The SPCF is intended for children and young people with Education, Health and Care Plans and can be used for:
 - Creating new (additional) places at good or outstanding provision
 - Improving facilities or developing new facilities

- 2.5 Although consultation about the SPCF and the publication of North Yorkshire's plan for year 1 of the funding took place at different times to consultation on the Strategic Plan for SEND education provision (the Strategic Plan), the two pieces of work are closely linked, and the use and expected impact of the SPCF is included in the Strategic Plan proposals.

3. Year 1 of the SPCF

- **3.1** Work funded through the SPCF in Year 1 has either been completed or is in progress:
 - The feasibility study was completed at The Forest School and the resulting work is being funded by Schools Condition Grant. This will result in an increase of 25 places at the school. The additional places will begin to be commissioned from September 2019.
 - Work at Springwater School to improve facilities has been completed. Although there was not an increase in capacity associated with this work, in fact an additional 6 places have been created and will be commissioned from September 2019.
 - Work at both the Dales School and Springhead School is underway and 6 additional places will be commissioned from each school from September 2019.

4. Years 2 and 3 of the SPCF

- **4.1** In year 1, £163 000 of SPCF was allocated, leaving £453 279. The next version of the LA's plan for the SPCF needs to include plans for the whole of this amount.
- **4.2** It was agreed in 2017 that the priority for the use of the SPCF in North Yorkshire would be to invest in developing sufficient specialist places within the county to establish sufficiency in order to ensure children and young people can be educated nearer to home and high needs funding can be used to support North Yorkshire schools in meeting the needs of children with SEND.
- **4.3** The number of children and young people with EHCPs continues to rise. There were 2600 children and young people with EHCPs in June 2018, and this is predicted to rise to over 3300 by 2022, an increase of around 30%. In this context the priority for use of the SPCF remains the same.
- **4.4** Proposals for use of years 2 and 3 of the SPCF have been considered by the Strategic Plan capital working group and the Strategic Plan and High Needs Funding Programme Board. Information considered included:
 - A report and feedback from site visits to special schools to consider maximising use of space and potential capacity
 - Overall strategic plan proposals and implications including requirements for the proposed Moorside/Mowbray satellite development
 - Proposals about possible developments in mainstream schools
- **4.5** Discussions have also taken place with the Special School Headteachers and more detailed discussions with the Headteachers of special schools where it is proposed to allocate funding.
- **4.6** CYPLT discussed the proposals on 22nd November 2018 and agreed for them to be presented to Executive Members to seek approval for consultation.
- **4.7** In the light of the priority outlined in 4.2 and 4.3 it is proposed that years 2 and 3 of the SPCF is allocated as follows:

School	Proposed work	Rationale	Cost
Brooklands School	Increase in capacity alongside improvement in facilities.	The work would increase capacity by 6-8 places and also there would be improvement in facilities e.g. changing area and wet room. Current forecasting indicates the need for these additional places.	£79 600
Moorside/ Mowbray satellite provision – Ripon area	Capital work required to the Moorside infant school site to adapt it to become a satellite of Mowbray Special School.	The work would deliver a satellite provision of Mowbray School which is currently heavily oversubscribed. The plan is for this to be a provision for primary aged pupils starting with 30 pupils and rising to 60. Current forecasting indicates the need for such provision. This would be a significant increase in capacity which would improve the North Yorkshire special school offer and reduce the need to send children to out of area, higher cost provision. There was support for the proposal to develop this provision during the Strategic Plan public consultation. The first consultation period for school organisation processes on the development of the satellite provision is was completed on 9th November 2018. In general consultees were supportive of the proposal.	£373 679 to cover internal and external works.

Both of the identified projects are in different geographical areas from work in year 1 of the SPCF giving more equity across the county.

4.8 An Equalities Impact Assessment has been developed for the SPCF proposals and this is attached at Appendix 1.

5. Next steps in respect of the Special Provision Capital Fund

- **5.1** The timeline of actions for the SPCF years 2 and 3 is as follows:
 - Proposals to be presented to Executive members for clearance to consult on proposals – 4th December 2018
 - Formal consultation 7th January to 15th February 2019
 - Overview and scrutiny committee 18th January 2019
 - Subject to consultation outcomes, proposals to be taken to the Executive for approval to implement - 12th March 2019
 - Publication of SPCF plan by 29th March 2019.

6. Recommendations

- **6.1** It is recommended that Executive Members:
 - Note the update on Year 1 SPCF work
 - Agree the proposals for use of the SPCF in years 2 and 3
 - Give approval to progress to consultation on the proposals for years 2 and 3 of the SPCF.

Section 1. Please describe briefly what this EIA is about. (E.g. are you starting a new service, changing how you do something, stopping doing something?)

Local authorities must ensure there are sufficient good school places for all pupils, including those with SEND. The Government has committed £265 million of special provision capital funding (SPCF) to help local authorities develop provision for children and young people with SEND, in consultation with parents and providers.

Local authorities can invest their share of the SPCF in:

- Creating new (additional) places at good or outstanding provision
- Improving facilities or developing new facilities.

The funding is for a range of provision types where this benefits children and young people with education, health and care plans (EHCPs) between 0 and 25.

North Yorkshire County Council (NYCC) has been allocated at total of £616 279 SPCF funding over a 3 year period.

Local authorities must publish a short plan that sets out how they intend to invest their SPCF allocation, which is visible to parents, carers and other local groups. The plan for local authorities' SPCF allocations should sit coherently with their wider strategic plan. North Yorkshire published its plan for year 1 of the SPCF in timescales by 14th March 2018. This can be seen at https://www.northyorks.gov.uk/send-specialist-support-and-provision. The plan must now be reviewed and updated to show what they have spent so far and to show updates to the plan. This must be done by 29th March 2019.

This EIA considers the impact of the proposed allocation of years 2 and 3 of SPCF funding which is set out in the NYCC SPCF Plan.

The changes proposed which NYCC is intending to go out to public consultation on, is in relation to:

 Works to improve special school facilities and increase capacity at Brooklands School, Skipton.

• Development of a satellite site for Mowbray School on the Moorside Infant School site, alongside the amalgamation of Moorside Infant and Junior School (school organisation process underway.)

The local authority has also developed an overarching strategic plan for SEND education provision, which was approved by The Executive on 4th September 2018. The plan can be seen at www.northyorks.gov.uk/sendplan. There has been significant informal and formal consultation undertaken with parents, carers, and professionals to shape the final Strategic Plan, which includes increasing provision within special schools.

Although consultation about the SPCF has and will take place at different times to consultation on the Strategic Plan for SEND education provision (the Strategic Plan), the two pieces of work are closely linked, and the SPCF is included in the Strategic Plan proposals. Phase 1 of the Strategic Plan includes the implementation of year 1 SPCF work and consultation on years 2 and 3. Phase 2 of the Strategic Plan includes implementing years 2 and 3 of SPCF work.

The overall strategic plan will include action to explore additional opportunities for securing capital funding to further develop different kinds of SEND education provision across the county.

Section 2. Why is this being proposed? What are the aims? What does the authority hope to achieve by it? (e.g. to save money, meet increased demand, do things in a better way.)

The proposals put forward are to ensure that the local authority can receive the allocated £616 279 SPCF and ensure this is effectively used to improve facilities and create additional special school places for children and young people with SEND in North Yorkshire.

The changes in years 2 and 3 aim to:

- Increase the number of special school places by at least 66 places for young people with SEND within North Yorkshire;
- Improve facilities at Brooklands special school.
- Support the development of a satellite site for Mowbray Special School.

The authority hopes to achieve;

- Receipt of years 2 and 3 of SPCF from the Department for Education, to implement the above changes;
- An increase in special school places to allow more children and young people with SEND to be educated in North Yorkshire.

Section 3. What will change? What will be different for customers and/or staff?

Increased places for SEND provision in special schools will enable more young people with SEND to be educated in their local area and/or in North Yorkshire.

Section 4. Involvement and consultation (What involvement and consultation has been done regarding the proposal and what are the results? What consultation will be needed and how will it be done?)

Involvement and consultation has been undertaken through a phase of informal engagement, followed by a formal consultation process.

Informal engagement

- Site visits were undertaken with all North Yorkshire special schools to consider maximising use of space and potential capacity
- Initial discussion with Special School Headteachers took place on 11th September 2018.
- Ongoing meetings/discussion about developing Mowbray Satellite alongside amalgamation of Moorside Infants and Junior School have taken place with LA and schools staff
- Meeting with NYPACT, North Yorkshire's parent/carer forum on 8th November 2018

Formal consultation

- A formal consultation took place from 18th May to 28th June 2018 on the Strategic Plan for SEND Education provision. This included consultation on the proposals to:
 - Increase the number of specialist day places in North Yorkshire special schools to ensure that children requiring specialist places can be educated locally
 - Explore establishing satellite specialist provision in the Ripon area
 - Implement the approved plan for year 1 of the SPCF
 - Consult on the proposals for using years 2 and 3 of the SPCF during phase 1 (of the Strategic Plan)
 - These proposals were supported.
- Formal school organisation processes including consultation are taking place in respect
 of the establishment of the Mowbray School satellite. Formal public consultation took
 place from 21 September 2018 and closed on 9 November 2018. In general, consultees
 were supportive of the proposed change. The Executive is due to consider authorising
 the publication of proposals and statutory notices on 27th November 2018.
- There is a planned formal consultation on the plan for years 2 and 3 of the SPCF. This will take place from 7th January 2019 to 15th February 2019.

Existing communication methods will used to promote the consultation for example via the e-Red Bag to schools, Local Offer, NYPACT, NYCC website, media releases. We will be ensuring that a clear message is delivered to ensure customers understand the context of this consultation – which is to receive the remaining SPCF from the DfE for years 2 and 3 (2019-2021), and how this supports proposals in the wider work of the strategic plan for SEND education provision.

Section 5. What impact will this proposal have on council budgets? Will it be cost neutral, have increased cost or reduce costs?

If the SPCF plan for years 2 and 3 is published by 29th March 2019, and approved by the DfE, NYCC will receive the remaining SPCF - £453 279, over years 2019/20 and 2020/21.

This funding will need to be spent according to the guidelines of the SPCF. (Please see https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/send-provision-capital-funding-for-pupils-with-ehc-plans for a link to the DfE guidelines).

This EIA has identified that the proposals for the SPCF, if approved, would have a positive and negative impact for children and young people with SEND.

Negative impact relating to the protected characteristic of age has been identified in respect of the proposal for the Mowbray satellite provision. Mitigating action has been identified.

Positive impact has been identified in relation to increased places and improved facilities for special education provision providing more opportunity for children and young people to be educated in North Yorkshire/locally and improve outcomes. It has also been identified that proportionately there may be an improvement for more boys than girls.
