**Crime:**

The crime figures above represent a comparison of part the third financial quarter covering the period 30<sup>th</sup> August 2017 to 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2017 from the previous three years

These figures show an increase of 1 crime based on the same period last year, representing a 0.4% increase.

There has been an increase in violent crime with Injury reported in the period. 61 violent incidents were reported in which the victim sustained an injury, a rise of 30 crimes on the previous year. Many of these incidents are domestic related (28). Of these 28 domestic assaults 5 involved the same parties (repeat victims and offenders). Violence offences also include offences of assaulting a Constable in the lawful execution of their duty. Of the 61 incidents 9 involved offences linked to the policing of protest in Kirby Misperton (15%).

Burglary Dwellings are down in the review period from 37 offences in 2016/17 to 24 representing a fall of 35.1%.

There have been 13 sexual offences reported in the period, 7 of which being allegations of rape. This represents a reduction of 25 crimes reported over the corresponding period last year. There have been two incidents whereby images were sent between parties that would constitute an offence. Of the offences 9 were historic offences, reported sometime after the incident or by third parties. One of these incidents being over 30 years old but reported to North Yorkshire Police within the last two months.

## Recipients Only

There has been a 40% decrease in vehicle crime from 20 to 12 crimes in the period. This reduction is welcome having followed a period of increased vehicle crime within the summer period.

The incidences of crime are typically thefts from insecure motor vehicles albeit there have been 3 motorvehicles (1 scooter, 1 x car and 1 x agricultural vehicle) stolen within this period. One of the incidents reported was the interference to a motorvehicle following a lorry surfing incident at Kirby Misperton.

The period has seen no movement in offences categorised as crimes against society. These offences include possession and trafficking of drugs, possession of offensive weapons and public order offences. It is worth noting that of these offences there has been a slight increase in public order incidents from 11 to 14. Of these public order incidents 3 are specific public order offences arising in the course of the policing of protest at Kirby Misperton.

There has been a 14% increase in criminal damage over the period from 36 incidents in 2016 compared with 41 in 2017. Of these incidents 10 offenders have been identified, 5 arrested, 3 dealt with by other disposal and in two incidents the complainant declined to prosecute the offender who was related to them. Six of the offences relate to the damage of crops or gates leading to fields that are believed to have been caused by poachers. The impact of poaching upon the local rural community is not underestimated and will be forming part of a problem solving plan to be undertaken this autumn. There are links between poaching and both associated crime (i.e. collateral damage) and acquisitive crime.

**Proactivity:**

The Ryedale Safer Neighbourhood Police Team have ensured a high visibility attendance at a number of public events around Halloween, Mischief Night and Bonfire Night. There will be additional resources focussed upon some of the upcoming and well attended public events. These will include local Christmas Fairs and light switch-ons. Local Community Policing surgeries are currently underway and should be advertised in local print and social media.

The Neighbourhood Policing Team continue to provide visibility and reassurance within the Kirby Misperton area during the transportation and logistics phase of Operation Kingfisher. There have been a number of instances of public disorder and lower level disruption to the commercial activities of Third Energy and to the wider community themselves. North Yorkshire Police are committed to the Community-led policing of this protest and there have been some challenges in the resourcing and approach to the protest.

The Safer Neighbourhood Team have responsibility to engage with a number of differing parties across the spectrum of protest and have additional weekly commitments. This has presented a challenge in the abstraction of staff from their Safer Neighbourhood roles.

There has been a not- inconsiderable impact upon local policing in Ryedale as a result albeit this is perhaps not representative in the crime figures themselves.

As a means of update, whilst not featuring within the Ryedale crime figures it is worthy of note that 9 people are due in court charged with criminal damage to the North Yorkshire Moors railway in July 2017.
