

The Selby Picture

The following table shows the total number of incidents cleared by SDC, estimated total tonnages and estimated collection and disposal costs of fly tipping in the district over the last 5 years.

Fly Tipping By Material Type

Where mixed loads have been tipped, the incident is recorded as the type of waste that is present in the largest amount / volume.

Material types highlighted in **red** are those that are chargeable at HWRC's.



Tyres


There was a significant increase in tyre tipping during 2017/18.

Household Waste Recycling Centres




HWRC – Notable Dates



Fly Tipping Review

Monitored by York and North Yorkshire Waste Management Partnership Review of minutes:

June 15 no measurable correlation to HWRC charges before/after

August 17 recent increases comparable to national picture

December 17 average size of fly-tip increasing – more commercial volumes

The general message is that whilst some materials that are charged for at HWRCs are fly-tipped, materials that don't attract charges are also fly-tipped.

It is not possible to prove a causal link between charges and fly-tipping.

Successful Prosecutions



January 2018

Timothy Gibbs-Youngman age 32, of Scunthorpe dumped 40 black bags on the M62 access road in Beal. This cost him a total of £1137.00.

Successful Prosecutions



August 2018

Aaron Foster age 20, of Barlby dropped a crisp packet near Skipwith Common Nature Reserve. This cost him a total of £434.

Successful Prosecutions



August 2018

Lubos Filek age 39, of Barlby dumped 6 black bags on Ousebank, Selby. This cost him a total of £480.

Don't Be a Waster

12 month campaign tackling environmental issues. Fly tipping month involved:

- Investment in new mobile CCTV cameras and signage at hot spot areas leading to a reduction in fly tipping in hot spot areas
- Introduction of 'Council Aware' stickers
- Innovative Clay Faces project





The Use of CCTV

The location of CCTV equipment and associated signage is reviewed on a regular basis. We need to ensure where equipment is sited that it is:

- **Justifiable**: There must be sound evidence to show that the cameras are an appropriate response. This will include information relating to the number, size and composition of fly tips in the proposed location.
- General: The target of the surveillance must be the general public or unknown offenders.
- Reviewable: There must be a clear audit trail allowing evaluation of both the deployment of the camera and the timescale.
- Objective: There must be clear and specific aims for each deployment and they must be monitored and recorded.

The Use of CCTV

CCTV cameras were first deployed in June 2017 and along with associated signage have been targeted at hot spot locations

- December 2016 to May 2017 63 fly tipping incidents at 9 hot spot locations
- December 2017 to May 2018 40 fly tipping incidents at the same hot spot locations

Operation Eyeball - Project Aims

To reduce fly tipping in rural North Yorkshire through multi agency working to:-

- · raise awareness in rural communities
- engage partners/stakeholders in delivery of educational campaigns and addressing hot spots
- sharing of intelligence of hot spots, suspect vehicles and waste carriers
- delivery of planned, targeted enforcement

Operation Eyeball - Project Aims

Superintendent Paula Booth, of North Yorkshire Police, said "This operation shows that the selfish crime of fly tipping will not be tolerated in our communities. There will be no let-up in our efforts, and we will continue to work closely with landowners and local authorities, sharing intelligence and information, to tackle this issue head-on"
