Central Area Forum Minutes of the Meeting

Open Session – Market Place

The open session had consultation tables from: North Yorkshire Police, North Yorkshire Highways, Access Selby Community Officer SDC, Air Pollution Consultation SDC, Heritage Lottery and representatives from British Gas.

There was also information available on how to access funding for local community projects.

Chairs Welcome / Introduction

Chair, Cllr Steve Shaw-Wright opened the meeting and thanked everyone for coming.

Inspector Michelle Falkingham from North Yorkshire Police - Michelle explained that the business is now very different to past years and there are real challenges ahead; the reduction of resources has influenced them to operate in different ways referring and linking with partners and local agencies.

Over the last year crime in the town has been variable with some reductions in certain areas, the following at the latest reported figures.

- Burglary to dwellings - this has increased by 23% an increase of 3 offences.
- Criminal damage - this has increased by 40% an increase of 38 crimes – Selby Park, The Community Centre, Scott Rd, Selby and Tiny Tots Nursery also in Selby Park have all experienced groups of young people congregating in those areas where some damage has taken place. CCTV has now been installed at the Community Centre which has resulted in an arrest recently been made.
- Anti Social Behaviour – There is a core group of youths between the ages of 11 and 18 years in the town on a regular basis, this has resulted in several dispersal notices and the details of a number of youths have been taken. Parents and Community officers have been involved in these incidents.
- Outside burglary (outbuildings/ sheds) - this has decreased by 35%.
- Robbery – There have been 4 robberies in Selby Town centre in the last six months compared to one last year. The community centre has been a target area for burglary.
- Cycle theft – Although this has been a major problem over the last few years this is has now reduced and is static at the present time.
- Shop theft - this has now reduced from 150% last year to 75% this year which is a decrease of 50%. Individuals from outside the area appear to target Selby as security guards and security devices appear to be low in many shops and supermarkets making them an easier target.

Some arrests have recently been made and bail has been given to ten offenders.

- Violence – There have been a number of incidents in Selby, some arrests have been made for offences in the New Inn Public House.
- Drugs and weapons – The police are vigilant and always acting to any reported incidents relating to this. More recordings are made using computers and mobile devices, this saves on office time.
- Night time economy – The night crew are always busy patrolling the local pubs, early intervention results in preventing many situations getting out of hand and reaching a solution is the best form of action before a major outbreak occurs

Targets for the next few months will be concentrated on vulnerable people, the elderly, people with ill health, disabilities etc. There will be cold calling visits round the whole district next week to see how people are affected. Communities with bungalows are a high priority to access the elderly that may be subject to scammers and house callers.

It has been reported that a number of vulnerable young girls have been seen getting into cars with older men.

It was recommended to report any such sightings to the police as soon as possible.

It is the intention to do more reporting of this crime and encourage people to come forward if they know of any such crimes taking place.

David Gluck from the Selby Town Enterprise Partnership

The overall purpose of the STEP strategy is to secure the town's role as the principal service centre for our district and to make it the destination of choice for shopping and leisure. This will mean a re-energised town centre which builds on the distinctive heritage of the town. The Selby Town Enterprise Partnership is a strategic body, which brings together the public and private sectors to support economic growth in the town of Selby.

Selby District Council has committed £150,000 to the town of Selby through its Programme for Growth 2012-2015 to enable those with an interest in economic growth in the town to make a start of growing enterprise.

In addition to this, there are a number of other opportunities for funding through the York North Yorkshire and East Riding LEP, the Leeds City Region LEP, the Big Lottery Fund, the Heritage Lottery Fund and a range of other sources.

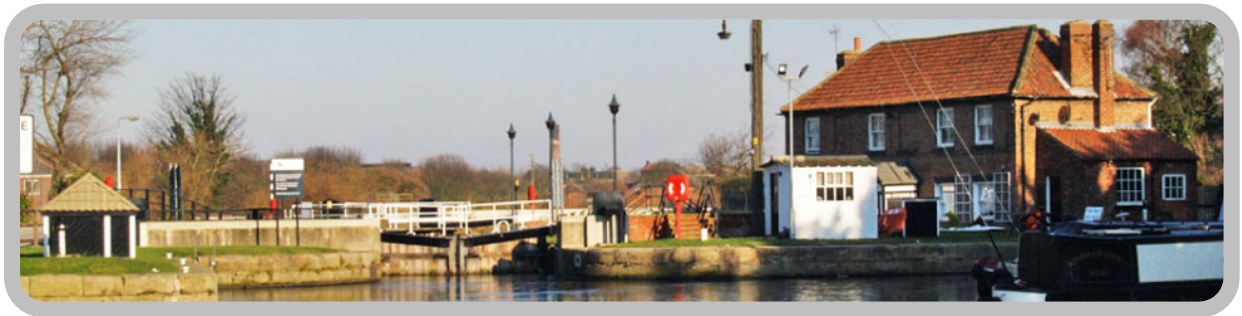

1.0 What are Community Engagement Forums?

Community Engagement Forums (CEFs) are public meetings at which you can raise any concern or make any comment about your local area and your local services.

They are split into two parts an open community forum where all residents of the CEF area can attend and a Partnership Board meeting which is open to the public but contributions can only be made at the chairs discretion.

The Community Forum meetings give you a chance to speak directly to the people who deliver your local services, for example policing, street cleaning and road safety. This is a chance for you to have your say about the issues that are important to you and the place where you live.

The Partnership Board meeting is where funding applications are discussed and necessary decisions are made for the furtherance of forum business. The Partnership Board is made up of District Councillors, Parish Councillors and co-opted members of the community.

CEFs will meet no less than 4 times in a year the timetable for each CEF will be decided by their Partnership Board and all dates will be published on Selby District Councils website at www.selby.gov.uk/community-engagement-forums-cefs

2.0 Purpose of the Community Development Plan.

The purpose of this plan is to focus our minds on what is important to us within our neighbourhoods and identify our priorities for the future. It has been created to encourage local people to share their views, time and expertise to deliver projects that will make a 'real' difference within our area.

In the production of this plan, we have engaged Groundwork North Yorkshire to work with us and a number of other agencies to gather information and consult with as many people as possible who live and work in the area, to reflect their views and opinions for inclusion in this plan.

3.0 What funding do we have?

The Partnership Board is allocated an annual budget which is divided into two halves, the first of which will be used at the discretion of the Partnership Board to help resolve local issues and/ or enhance local services. The second will be used to further the objectives of the areas Community Development Plan by allocating grants to specific projects and schemes who apply to the Community Fund.

4.0 Facts and Figures

The Central Area CEF has a population of 20,783 people. 14,731 live in the town of Selby whilst 5,299 live in the parish of Brayton and 753 live in the parish of Barlow. Approximately 28% of residents are under the age of 24 with the highest ratio of young people living in Selby against the parish total.

In terms of the older people, 23% are over the age of 60 with the highest ratio of older people living in the parish of Brayton against the parish total. These statistics indicate that demands on services will continue to grow over the coming years.

19% of residents in Selby rate themselves as having some limiting long-term illness, compared to 17% in Brayton and 14% in Barlow.

Overall 2,104 residents within the the Central Area CEF are providing care for others. This equates to 8% of the population with the biggest proportion living in the Brayton Parish which is indicative of the aging population within that area.

Out of the four wards, Selby East and Selby West fall within the lowest quintile (most deprived 20%) in England in the overall Index of Multiple Deprivation covering income; employment; health; education; barriers to housing and services; crime and living environment.

It is noted that Selby West Ward is the most deprived ward in the district and ranking 2057 IMD in England.

5.0 Consultation

In the preparation of this plan, we have drawn evidence together from from a number of previous consultations over the past three years to give us the basis of our key objectives.

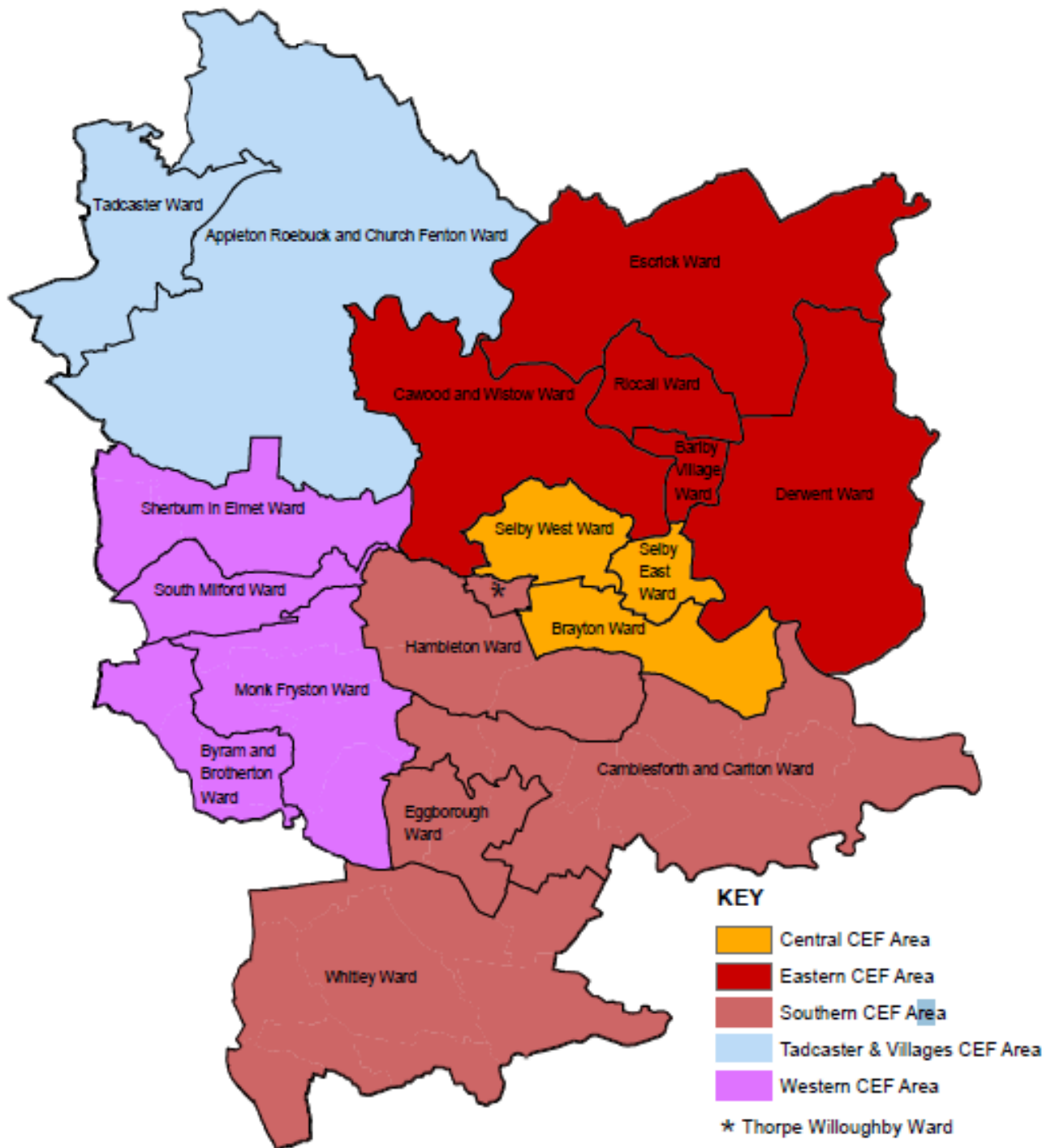
These consultations have included participatory research undertaken as part of the Big Local initiative, the consultation evidence that formed the basis of the Selby South Community First Plan and audits undertaken as part of the Selby Town Enterprise Partnership (STEP).

This list is by no means exhaustive and projects are generated through public concerns raised at the Community Engagement Forum meetings.

6.0 What area do we cover?

Our area of responsibility not only covers the town of Selby, but also includes the parishes of Barlow and Brayton.
