ALTERNATIVE PROVISION AND SUPPORT BRIEFING PAPER ON BEHAVIOUR & MEDICAL PROVISION CONTINUUM

1.0 **INTRODUCTION**

1.1 This brief paper covers a wide range of provision made available for children educated outside mainstream schools.

2.0 ENHANCED MAINSTREAM PRIMARY SCHOOLS

- 2.1 There are eight primary schools in North Yorkshire that have been enhanced to support schools and work with primary-aged children with challenging behaviours. These schools also provide support to younger children with medical needs:
 - Barrowcliff School;
 - Braeburn Infant & Nursery School;
 - Malton CP School;
 - Bedale CE Primary School;
 - Greatwood CP School;
 - Barwic Parade CP School:
 - Starbeck CP School;
 - Grove Road CP School.
- 2.2 These schools, all funded from the high needs block, were established between 2008-10 as a direct action resulting from the 2006 SEN and Behaviour Review.
- 2.3 Currently work is underway on developing a school in the North of the County. In the meantime services are provided from Hambleton & Richmondshire PRS.
- 2.4 The schools work on both an outreach and in-reach basis both advising other schools on good practice as well as directly educating and caring for some of the most challenging pupils either on a part-time or full-time basis.
- 2.5 A review of practice and impact of these schools in January found performance to be good overall and developing.

3.0 **ALTERNATIVE PROVISION – PRUS**

- 3.1 As of September 2012, North Yorkshire has five pupil referral units, Scarborough, Harrogate, Hambleton and Richmondshire, Craven and Selby.
- 3.2 The Pupil Referral Units provide both statutory and discretionary/preventative services. Statutory service included the education of:
 - Children permanently excluded from school;
 - Children with medical needs:
 - Young offenders.

Preventative/discretionary work includes educating the following groups:

- Chronic non-attendees, including those who have a medical note and/or are deemed to be school-phobic;
- Pupils who have had repeated fixed term exclusions, or at risk of permanent exclusion;
- Pupils who are 'Looked After' by the LA and are vulnerable to exclusion;
- Pupils who are known to the Youth Justice Service;
- Pupils within families which have been identified through the 'Troubled Families' initiative:
- Pupils who are difficult to place and to whom the 'In Year Fair Access' protocol applies;
- Pupils who require a highly personalised KS4 curriculum beyond which can reasonably be provided by their mainstream school;
- Pupils requiring a 'managed move' or awaiting school placement;
- Pupils requiring alternative provision as a result of complex medical needs or pending a medical assessment;
- Pregnant school girls who require support beyond that which could be reasonably provided by a mainstream school;
- Young mothers and fathers who require a specialised curriculum and/or pastoral support beyond that which could be reasonably provided by a mainstream school;
- Pupils encountering exceptional circumstances which require a highly personalised curriculum and specialist advice and support.
- 3.3 Access to the PRUs is decided by a local Behaviour and Attendance collaborative. This group is made up of senior representatives from local schools and LA Officers and representatives from the PRU/s. Ultimately it is the decision of the headteacher of the PRS to decide whether a placement is appropriate or not.
- 3.4 All PRU/s go way beyond their statutory duties providing exceptional services to children families and schools. Delays in admission are rare if a child needs a placement they will receive it however there is a fine balance between a new child entering the service and this over-stretching the overall service being offered.

4.0 **FUNDING FOR THE PRS**

- 4.1 This has evolved over the years largely on demand-led basis. Currently consultation is underway or a new formula for funding the PRUs from the high needs block as a direct result of national funding changes.
- 4.2 Currently all PRU/s are centrally led operating with devolved budgets but from April 2013. PRUs will have delegated funds for statutory work and the Local Authority will commission PRUs directly for preventative work.

5.0 MEDICAL NEEDS

5.1 Since 2009 and as a direct result of proposals in the 2006 SEN and behaviour Local Authority review, PRUs also began to take responsibility for the children who had medical needs. The statutory responsibility is to educate these children for five hours a week –

through a combination of commitment and clever timetabling most children in North Yorkshire are offered education for 10 hours per week. In 2012-11, 76 children were in receipt of this service and in 2011-12 it rose slightly to 85.

6.0 **BESD SPECIAL NEEDS**

- 6.1 North Yorkshire has two special schools for children with challenging behaviours, Brompton Hall, near Scarborough and the newly opened Foremost School between Harrogate and Scarborough. Brompton Hall is a good school working with children between 8-16. It has been successfully run by its Headteacher Mark Mihkelson for ten years.
- 6.2 Foremost School is largely an old school Baliol on a new site. It has been opened since March 2012. There have undoubtedly been challenges in developing this resource and work is on-going.

7.0 **RECOMMENDATION**
