
1.0 Purpose of the Report

1.1 This report sets out the overall process for considering a Mayoral Combined Authority along with the core principles being observed in preparing for implementation of the devolution deal and the Terms of Reference for this Joint Committee.

2.0 Executive Summary

- 2.1. Following the announcement of the 'minded to' devolution deal on 1 August 2022, plans have been developed to follow the statutory process and develop implementation plans.
- 2.2. As part of the statutory process, the constituent councils (City of York Council and North Yorkshire Council) must undertake the following
 - 1. Undertake a governance review to identify whether implementation of the devolution deal will improve the exercise of the statutory functions in the area
 - 2. Develop and publish for consultation, a scheme that explains:
 - (a) How the new Mayoral Combined Authority for York and North Yorkshire will be created with the newly created North Yorkshire Council and York as the two local authority Members. The newly created Combined Authority will have the Mayor as the Chair.
 - (b) How the Mayoral Combined Authority will make decisions and the powers it will have.
 - (c) How transport will be dealt with on an integrated basis.
 - 3. Review the findings of the consultation and agree whether to submit the scheme to Whitehall parliamentary approval
 - 4. Once the Parliamentary Order has been drafted in Whitehall, consent to the order.
- 2.3. Following the publication of the 'minded to' devolution deal, the constituent Councils met and have approved
 - The minded to Devolution Deal

- The Governance Review and its conclusion that the exercise of statutory functions in the area will be improved by creating a Mayoral Combined Authority for York and North Yorkshire
- A Scheme for consultation, which will run for eight weeks. This
 consultation is currently underway and will conclude on 16 December
- Creation of a Joint Committee to oversee the implementation process of the devolution deal.
- 2.4 Following the consultation, the Institute of Consultation will then review the findings and provide an independent report for the Constituent Councils to consider before agreeing whether to submit the Scheme to Whitehall for Parliamentary Approval.
- 2.5 The following timeline summarises the implementation timeline



3.0 Joint Committee Terms of Reference

- 3.1 Clearly a decision has not yet been taken about whether to create a Mayoral Combined Authority for North Yorkshire and York. However it is prudent to create a Joint Committee of the constituent councils to ensure there is an appropriate forum to work together to progress Devolution. If a subsequent decision is made not to proceed with the Devolution Deal, the Joint Committee can be dissolved or its Terms of Reference can be reconsidered. However in the interim the Terms of Reference set out the functions of the Joint Committee along with its membership and decision making protocol.
- 3.2 Annex A provides the detailed Terms of Reference, however for ease:
 - The function of the Joint Committee is to have oversight of the
 development of the York and North Yorkshire Combined Authority subject
 to approval being made to proceed with a Mayoral Combined Authority.
 The Joint Committee will also seek to ensure that any potential future
 Mayoral Combined Authority is able to be launched in accordance with the
 Statutory Orders issued by Government.
 - Subject to approval, the Joint Committee will ensure that sufficient resources are made available to support the creation and implementation of the York and North Yorkshire Combined Authority which includes financial management and oversight, securing of appropriate resources (officers, technical and otherwise) to enable delivery and the development of governance and a policy framework.
 - Membership of the Joint Committee is:

Voting Members	 Two Executive Members appointed from City of York Council; and Two Executive Members appointed from North Yorkshire County Council
Non-Voting Members	 The Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner; and A nominated representative of the LEP

3.3 The proposed Terms of Reference require that a Chair and Vice Chair be appointed, from amongst the members of the committee, at this first meeting.

4.0 Programme Management

4.1 As detailed above the statutory consultation is underway and, pending the outcome of the consultation, preparations have begun to develop a full implementation plan. This will be presented to the Joint Committee following the Councils' Decisions in Feb 23, if the decision is taken to progress.

4.2 For the purposes of clarity the programme team have separated activity as:

Governance	Securing the required approvals and developing the formal constitution, assurance and democratic services functions.
Building the MCA	Scoping and commissioning the systems and procedures required to run the organisation subject to approval being given to proceed.

HR	Organisation structure design, staff transfer considerations & recruitment strategy
Implementing the Deal	Implementing the commitments agreed through the negotiations of the asks process.

Police, Fire & Crime Commissioner	The PFCC is an existing legal entity (two corporations sole – the Local Policing Body and the Fire & Rescue Authority) with independent funding streams. A separate workstream will plan the potential transition of the PFCC under the Mayor and into the MCA.

- 4.3 In developing the headline plan the following have been taken into account:
 - 1. As detailed above, the deal is currently a 'minded to' deal and is subject to the final decision to consider the consultation responses and approval of a final Scheme for submitting to Whitehall expected to take place in Feb 23.
 - 2. If submitted to Whitehall, the submitted Scheme will be subject to central government due diligence, prior to an order being created. This draft order will also require consent from constituent Authorities (likely May/June 2023) and if consent is given, it could receive assent in Nov 23.
 - 3. Any activity or costs incurred prior to Nov 23 are at risk, however if the deal progresses and the Order is passed in Parliament, the costs can be recouped from both capacity funding and Mayoral Investment Funding. This was agreed within the Executive Reports in September/October 2022.
- 4.4 Considering the above assumptions, the principles used to develop the plans are therefore:

- Any costs incurred prior to the constituent council decision in February 23 should be restricted to activity which:
 - o Is required to support the formal decision making process; or
 - Is required to meet the statutory responsibilities of the MCA within the timescales detailed in the plan; or
 - Is required to ensure the financial aspects of the deal can be delivered, in particular the expenditure which must be defrayed within the current CSR period.
- 4.5 It is accepted that this activity is at risk and a maximum budget has been agreed at £600k, with any expenditure to be signed off jointly by the CYC and NYC S151 Officers. This budget was agreed by both City of York and North Yorkshire County Councils as part of the formal decisions made in September/October 2022.
- 4.6 Following the February decisions a full implementation plan will be presented and any costs which will be incurred will be subject to a costed plan to be approved and may include the above plus additional activity which optimises the deal and positions YNY for future investment.

5.0 Police Fire & Crime Commissioner

5.1 The Police, Fire & Crime Commissioner is an existing legal entity (two corporations sole – the Local Policing Body and the Fire & Rescue Authority). The PFCC also has independent income streams including the police and fire levy. The core principle within implementation is therefore that the PFCC will remain a ringfenced entity sitting within the MCA, retaining is existing governance, structures and collaborations. This will minimise risk and support continuity of delivery.

6.0 Financial implications

6.1 The financial implications are set out in the body of this report. The financial implications for the potential to create a combined authority will be considered separately. This report looks purely at creating the joint devolution committee.

Annex A: JOINT DEVOLUTION COMMITTEE – TERMS OF REFERENCE

<u>Summary of the York and North Yorkshire Joint Devolution Committee</u> <u>Functions</u>

The York and North Yorkshire Joint Committee is established under Section 101(5) of the Local Government Act 1972, as applied by Section 9EB of the Local Government Act 2000 and Regulation 11 of the Local Authorities (Arrangements for the Discharge of Functions) (England) Regulations 2012 by the Executives of City of York Council and North Yorkshire County Council.

The Joint Committee will oversee and make decisions as required to ensure that stages of considering a Devolution deal prior to a potential creation of a mayoral combined authority is considered jointly by members of North Yorkshire Council and the City of York. The Joint Committee will provide a venue to review collaboratively the provisions of implementing the Deal and collaborating on projects that benefit the region through Devolution.

Membership

The Joint Committee will comprise of:

Two Executive Members appointed from City of York Council; and Two Executive Members appointed from North Yorkshire County Council

The Executives of the two constituent councils have resolved to establish a joint arrangement to carry out the functions of the Joint Committee. Only Executive Members can be appointed and membership of the joint committee does not need to reflect the political composition of the Council

The following shall be invited to attend and participate in formal meetings of the joint committee however they will not have voting rights and they will not have the right to receive any confidential information pursuant to Schedule 12A Local Government Act 1972 which may from time to time be part of a formal agenda:

- The Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner
- A nominated representative of the LEP

Substitutes

Each constituent Council may appoint substitute members to attend formal meetings of the joint committee.

Appointment Chair and Vice Chair

The Joint Committee, at its first meeting, shall appoint a Chair and Vice Chair from amongst its constituent members. The Chair and Vice Chair will not be from the same constituent Authority.

Quoracy

The four Executive Members appointed to the Joint Committee (or their substitutes) will constitute a quorum

Voting

Decisions will be made by majority vote. In the event of a vote being required, each Executive Member (or substitute Executive) will have the ability to cast one vote. In the event of a tied vote, the decision will be deemed not to have carried.

Decisions made will be binding on both Constituent Authorities

Rules of Procedure

The Standing Orders for North Yorkshire County Council will be the relevant Standing Orders for Rules of Procedure for formal meetings.

Frequency of Meetings

The Joint Committee shall meet as and when required to do so either at the request of the respective Leaders of the Constituent Councils and or at the request of the Chief Operating Officer of City of York Council and or the Chief Executive of North Yorkshire County Council. Each meeting shall be classed as a formal meeting supported by agenda, reports and minutes.

Administration of the York and North Yorkshire Joint Committee

North Yorkshire Council will take responsibility for the administration and support for the delivery of meetings for the joint committee. This includes production and publication of agendas, hosting of meetings and as such the Standing Orders as they relate to North Yorkshire County Council will be adopted for the purposes of supporting the Joint Committee.

Access to Information

As all the members of a joint committee are members of the executive in each of the constituent authorities then its access to information regime is the same as that applied to the executive.

Review of the terms of reference for the Joint Committee

In the event that the terms of reference for the joint committee require review and or amendment, this will be delegated to the Monitoring Officer in consultation with the Leader of the respective Council and the Chief Executive/Chief Operating Officer of the respective Council.

FUNCTIONS

The Joint Committee will have oversight of the development of the York and North Yorkshire Combined Authority and ensure that it is able to be launched in accordance with the Statutory Orders issued by Government.

The Joint Committee will ensure that sufficient resources are made available to support the creation and implementation of the York and North Yorkshire Combined Authority which includes financial management and

oversight, securing of appropriate resources (officers, technical and otherwise) to enable delivery and the development of governance and a policy framework.

York and North Yorkshire Brownfield Housing Fund and Net Zero Fund

1.0 Purpose of the Report

- 1.1 This report sets out the details for implementing the Brownfield Housing Fund and Net Zero Fund, two investment programmes that form part of the Devolution Deal for York and North Yorkshire.
- 1.2 To highlight resource implications for the delivery of these programmes.
- 1.3 The report seeks the endorsement of the Joint Committee to proceed with the implementation of these Funds to ensure full delivery by March 2025.

2.0 Background

- 2.1 On the 1st August 2022 a Devolution Deal between the Government and the Local Authorities of York and North Yorkshire was announced. This included the award of funding:
 - £7 million of funding across 2023/24 and 2024/25 to enable the area to drive green economic growth towards our ambitions to be a carbon negative region, known as 'Net Zero Fund'; and
 - £12.7 million of devolved capital funding across 2023/24 and 2024/25 to support the building of new homes on brownfield land, known as 'Brownfield Housing Fund'.
- 2.2 In order to ensure that these two investment programmes are delivered by March 2025, draft prospectuses have been drawn up for each of these funds. This will enable a call for proposals to be launched in December and projects to be identified, assessed and prioritised by June 2023 so that expenditure can begin in November 2023.
- 2.3 These prospectuses have been drafted in collaboration between officers at the Local Enterprise Partnership and the Local Authorities, with advice from the relevant Government Department.

3.0 Brownfield Housing Fund (£12.7m)

- 3.1 The purpose of the York and North Yorkshire brownfield housing fund is to unlock housing development on brownfield sites to enable new homes to start on site by March 2025.
- 3.2 Initially we are looking for proposals that will help to deliver the £12.7m initial funding allocation. However we would also like to build up a pipeline of further projects for future years, so we will also seek potential future housing opportunities.
- 3.3 Funding is available to both public and private sector bodies across the housing sector. These include:
 - Local Authorities within York and North Yorkshire
 - Housing Associations/Registered Providers
 - Private Sector Developers (subject to Subsidy Control Compliance)
 - Any other Housing Developers (i.e. community cooperatives)

- 3.4 The funding is for capital expenditure only, and can fund a range of interventions that unlock the development of housing on brownfield land which would otherwise not happen. Eligible capital expenditure includes:
 - Off site infrastructure
 - Place infrastructure such as public realm, place-making interventions
 - Site remediation and demolition to prepare sites
 - On site infrastructure
 - Direct delivery of new homes
 - Site acquisition and land assembly
 - Capacity to support any of the capital delivery activity detailed above where it is directly attributable to the creation or maintenance of a capital asset.
- 3.5 The Fund will contribute to the overall aspirations and vision for the York and North Yorkshire economy. In particular the ambition for more affordable, high quality and low carbon homes. It is proposed that priority is given to schemes that deliver the following priorities:
 - Low carbon and modern methods of construction
 - Enhanced energy efficiency standards
 - Decarbonised heat measures
 - Adaptable and accessible properties to support local needs
 - Enhanced place making.
- 3.6 It should be noted, that the intervention rate has been set by Government for the Programme and, whilst the rate per scheme may vary, the average should be £14,000 per home. The target to deliver with the initial £12.7m is therefore to unlock 900-1000 homes.
- 3.7 Achieving this level of homes unlocked with the modest £14,000 average intervention per homes represents a significant risk in York and North Yorkshire, especially with the condensed delivery window of Nov 23 (when the MCA is created and funding drawn down) through to Mar 25.
- 3.8 Government are currently indicating no flexibility in the delivery window or intervention rate for the scheme, therefore to maximise the delivery potential we will operate an open call for projects across a broad range of partners to ascertain the strength of the pipeline. This call will go out in December 22 and will include a range of promotional activity including workshops for interested parties.
- 3.9 Annex A The prospectus attached to this report sets out the details of the scheme.

4.0 Net Zero Fund (£7m)

- 4.1 The purpose of the York and North Yorkshire Net Zero Fund is to enable the area to drive green economic growth towards our ambitions to be a carbon negative region.
- 4.2 Initially, we are looking for proposals that will help to deliver the initial £7m funding allocation. However, we will also seek to build up a pipeline of further projects for future years.
- 4.3 The aim is to enable the development and delivery of net zero projects, aligned with York and North Yorkshire's Routemap to Carbon Negative. This includes £6m of capital funding and £1m of revenue funding. The capital funding will enable the delivery of net zero projects whilst the revenue funding will support the development of a future pipeline of investible net zero projects. The Fund is therefore being delivered under two programmes of activity:

Programme 1: Capital Grants for Project Delivery (£6m)

- 4.4 The fund will enable the delivery of net zero projects that otherwise would not happen. Projects will support the implementation of York and North Yorkshire's Routemap to Carbon Negative, City of York's Climate Change Strategy and the forthcoming North Yorkshire Council's Climate Change Strategy.
- 4.5 Grant funding is available to public and private sector bodies within York and North Yorkshire who are wanting to deliver local net zero projects for communal or public benefit. This includes Local Authorities, Community Groups, Charities or Businesses
- 4.6 This element of the funding is for capital expenditure only, and can fund a broad range of interventions that unlock the delivery of net zero projects that otherwise would not happen. This includes:
 - Installation of renewable energy generation
 - Grid connection
 - · On site infrastructure
 - Low carbon equipment / machinery
 - Capacity to support any of the capital delivery activity detailed above where it is directly attributable to the creation or maintenance of a capital asset


Programme 2: Project Development Support (£1m)

- 4.7 The fund will support the development of net zero projects, from initial propositions up to full business cases. This will enable us to build an investible pipeline of projects that will make a significant contribution to delivering net zero, energy security and economic growth.
- 4.8 Funding will support project development, including initial project scoping, feasibility studies and business case development up to investor-ready stage and grants are available to public and private sector bodies operating within York and North Yorkshire, who are wanting to develop local net zero projects for communal or public benefit. These include Local Authorities and other public sector organisations, Community Groups, Charities or Businesses
- 4.9 The funding is for revenue expenditure only, and can fund a range of interventions that support net zero project development up to business case stage. Eligible revenue expenditure includes:
 - Project scoping
 - Community engagement
 - Feasibility studies
 - Business case development.
- 4.10 For both Programme 1 (Capital Grants) and Programme 2 (Project Development Support) applications must contribute to the overall ambition for York and North Yorkshire to be a carbon negative economy. Projects must deliver on one or more strategic priority within York & North Yorkshire's Routemap to Carbon Negative, across:
 - Power
 - Heat & Buildings
 - Transport
 - Business & Industry
 - Land Use, Agriculture & Marine.

4.11 Annex B - The prospectus for these two programmes under the Net Zero Fund are attached to this report. This sets out the detail of the Fund. The intention again is to launch this Fund in December 2023 with spend to start from November/December 2023.

5.0 Assurance Process

- 5.1 The York and North Yorkshire LEP currently operates a Green Book compliant assurance process which has been approved by DLUHC through the LEP Assurance Framework. Based on this process an interim Combined Authority process has been developed to support appraisal and decision making. Annex C provides an overview of the process.
- 5.2 For the purposes of clarity, the Devolution Joint Committee will make the following decisions within the process
 - 1. Agree the Project Scope Pack (This meeting)
 - 2. At the Expression of Interest stage, agrees the prioritised list of shortlisted projects
 - 3. A Full Business Plan Stage approves individual investments.



6.0 Roles and Responsibilities

- 6.1 In order to retain independence in the decision making process, the York and North Yorkshire LEP will undertake the programme management and appraisal function in advance of the MCA being created.
- 6.2 With the LEP being fully integrated into the MCA, the LEP team will be in scope for TUPE and this model will therefore support continuity of delivery and retention of skills.
- 6.3 Notwithstanding the above, investments decisions will be made by the Joint Committee.

7.0 Resources to Support Delivery

- 7.1 Once these two Funds are launched there will be resource implications in terms of the following:
 - Communications Both calls will need some level of comms to ensure they reach as wide an audience as possible. This will primarily be done through existing networks and through Local Authority contacts, however there will be some call for press releases and marketing.

- Webinars/information sessions In order to provide potential applicants with detailed information about the Funds it is proposed to host a series of funding webinars, these will need to be set up and organised.
- Responding to calls Open funding calls of this nature will always trigger a series of
 questions. These will need to be managed and responded to. This may have a
 significant impact on existing resources in dealing with these queries.
- Legal and Assurance There will be some significant resource implication in receiving, assessing, appraising and responding to the applications submitted.
- Developing the business cases and projects primarily this will be the task of the
 potential applicants but to ensure high quality applications some assistance and support
 will be required.
- 7.2 The level of resource required and currently available is being assessed. This will cover the next six months for the supporting the call process and will be approved by the S151 Officers in accordance with their devolved responsibilities.
- 7.3 It should be noted that the devolution included £378k capacity funding to support the Brownfield Programme.

Brownfield Housing Fund

Background

On the 1st August 2022 a Devolution Deal between the government and the local authorities of York and North Yorkshire was announced. This included the proposal to establish a York and North Yorkshire Mayoral Combined Authority.

As a mayoral combined authority, the York and North Yorkshire Combined Authority will be awarded £12.7 million of devolved capital funding across 2023/24 and 2024/25 to support the building of new homes on brownfield land.

This prospectus sets out an opportunity to bid for this funding.

Initially we are looking for proposals that will help to deliver this initial funding allocation. However we would also like to build up a pipeline of further projects for future years, so we would still like to hear from you about potential future housing opportunities.

Launch of call for proposals – 12th December 2022 Closing date for Expressions of Interest – Noon 20th January 2023 Shortlisting of prioritised Proposals – 24th February 2023 Full Business Case Submission – open between 1st March to 28th April 2023 Approval – From June 2023 Funding Available – December 2023 Housing starts target to be delivered by March 2025.



Brownfield Housing Fund

What is the York and North Yorkshire Brownfield Housing Fund

The Purpose

The purpose of the York and North Yorkshire brownfield housing fund is to unlock housing development on brownfield sites to enable new homes to start on site by March 2025.

Priority will be given to schemes that help to deliver affordable, accessible and low carbon housing, creating sustainable and high quality places.

As part of the York and North Yorkshire Devolution Deal, we have received an allocation from the Governments Brownfield Housing Fund of £12.7m. The target with this is estment is to unlock 900-1000 homes. The intervention rate necessary to achieve this target is around £14,000 per home unlocked. This intervention rate will be considered when assessing schemes but higher rates will be looked at under specific circumstances and if a strong case can be made. Other factors such as strategic fit and value for money of the scheme will also be assessed.

Who can apply for funding?

Funding is available to public and private sector bodies across the housing sector (subject to the production of a strong and compliant Business Case). Bodies include:

- · Local Authorities within York and North Yorkshire
- Housing Associations/Registered Providers
- Private Sector Developers (subject to Subsidy Control Compliance)
- Any other Housing Developers (i.e. community cooperatives)

What Type of investments can be funded?

On the 1st August 2022 a Devolution Deal between the Government and the Local Authorities of York and North Yorkshire was announced. This included the proposal to establish a York and North Yorkshire Mayoral Combined Authority.




Full Business Case development (40 days)
