Grant Acceptance –York & North Yorkshire Local Enterprise Partnership Core Funding

Report of the Corporate Director Community Development

1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To recommend that the Executive Member for Open to Business following consultation with the Corporate Director of Community Development, the Corporate Director - Resources and the Assistant Chief Executive (Legal and Democratic Services) authorises the acceptance of the grant of £250,000 from the Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, for York & North Yorkshire Local Enterprise Partnership Core Funding.

2.0 BACKGROUND

2.1 The York and North Yorkshire Local Enterprise Partnership (YNY LEP) have in previous years delivered services across the York and North Yorkshire area fulfilling the required duties with financial support from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC). YNY LEP act via their accountable body the North Yorkshire Council (NYC).

3.0 CURRENT ISSUE

3.1 For 2023/2024 financial year, the offer of annual grant funding has been made in the sum of £250,000 from the DLUHC for delivery of the York and North Yorkshire Local Enterprise Partnership (Appendix A).

4.0 CONTRIBUTION TO COUNCIL PRIORITIES

4.1 The York and North Yorkshire Growth Hub business support services which will be enabled by the grant from DLUHC will contribute towards:

Economy

- economically sustainable growth that enables people and places to prosper
- new and existing businesses can thrive and grow
- North Yorkshire has a high profile, is influential nationally and receives its fair share of resources

5.0 ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS CONSIDERED

5.1 The alternative would be to decline the grant, which would result in being unable to provide the level of service expected by Government, through the DLUHC approach to delivery of Mayoral Combined Authorities/Local Enterprise Partnerships.

6.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 6.1 The total grant funding offer is £250,000 from DLUHC for delivery of the York and North Yorkshire Local Enterprise Partnership. This is a grant provided under Section 31 of the Local Government Act 2003, and as such the grant does not have specific Terms and Conditions, but the Assurance Framework requirements for Local Enterprise Partnerships set out by DLUHC must be met. A copy of the DLUHC Determination No. 31/6726 is provided at Appendix B). A performance review is carried out twice a year by DLUHC.
- 6.2 The grant will be payable to NYC, as the accountable body for the YNY LEP. YNY LEP will administer monitoring and reporting of activities supported by the grant and will ensure compliance with NYC Finance and Legal requirements.
- 6.3 The level of financial risk is low. The service has been established and operating in the same way for several years therefore systems and processes are already in place to utilise the grant for the delivery of services provided by YNY LEP.

7.0 LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

7.1 The grant enables the required services to be provided by YNY LEP via its accountable body NYC. There are no specific terms and conditions available in respect of the grant. However, services must be delivered in accordance with the National Assurance Framework for LEPs as set out by DLUHC.

8.0 EQUALITIES IMPLICATIONS

8.1 An Equalities Impact Assessment has been completed (Appendix C). No equalities implications have been identified.

9.0 CLIMATE CHANGE IMPLICATIONS

9.1 A Climate Change Impact Assessment has been completed (Appendix D) and no climate change implications have been identified. It should be noted that there may be some indirect positive effects enabled by the activities of the YNY LEP particularly through the delivery of the Route Map to Carbon Negative for York and North Yorkshire.

10.0 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

10.1 The recommendation for acceptance of the grant from Department for Levelling Up Housing and Communities will enable the Yorkshire and North Yorkshire Local Enterprise Partnership through its accountable body NYC to continue provision of services during 2023/2024 across York and North Yorkshire.

11.0 RECOMMENDATION(S)

That the Executive Member for Open to Business following consultation with the Corporate Director of Community Development, the Corporate Director - Resources and the Assistant Chief Executive (Legal and Democratic Services) authorises the acceptance of the grant of £250,000 from the Department for Levelling Up Housing

and Communities, for York & North Yorkshire Local Enterprise Partnership Core Funding.

Grant Acceptance –York & North Yorkshire Made Smarter Business Support Programme

Report of the Corporate Director Community Development

1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To recommend that the Executive Member for Open to Business following consultation with the Corporate Director of Community Development, the Corporate Director - Resources and the Assistant Chief Executive (Legal and Democratic Services) authorises the acceptance of the grant of £208,860 from South Yorkshire Mayoral Combined Authority (funded by Department for Business and Trade).

2.0 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The York and North Yorkshire Local Enterprise Partnership (YNY LEP) delivers the free Growth Hub business support service across the York and North Yorkshire area on behalf of the Department for Business and Trade (formerly Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy BEIS). YNY LEP act via their accountable body North Yorkshire Council (NYC).
- 2.2 In addition to the basic Growth Hub Business Support service delivered by the YNY LEP Growth Hub this funding provides the opportunity to deliver a specialist business support programme Made Smarter, developed by HM Government and designed to help local manufacturing businesses to innovate and create new opportunities and technologies in the process. This aims to support the UK to become a leader in the manufacturing industry and develop the next generation of technology solutions.

3.0 CURRENT ISSUE

- 3.1 As part of the Yorkshire and Humber Growth Hubs cluster for the region, Dept for Business and Trade (DBT) has commissioned South Yorkshire Mayoral Combined Authority (SYMCA) to lead the delivery of the Made Smarter programme of specialist business support across Yorkshire and the Humber region.
- 3.2 York and North Yorkshire LEP has been offered grant funding in the sum of £208,860 as part of the Yorkshire and Humber delivery programme. The funding offer has been made by SYMCA, for delivery of the York and North Yorkshire Made Smarter business support service, using grant funds from the Department of Business and Trade.
- 3.3 The grant provides funding for a specialist business relationship manager employed within the York and North Yorkshire Growth Hub Business Support Service, and for

- a programme of events and marketing activity aimed at engaging with the target businesses that can then be supported by the programme.
- 3.4 The specialist support provided will help a business to create an effective business plan to ensure they are optimising opportunities for the adoption of technology. There is also a business grant application process offering up to a maximum of £20,000, based on a 50% match contribution towards total costs, for equipment and/or specialist advice to implement projects. However, it should be noted that the business grants do NOT form part of this grant acceptance but are being managed directly between SYMCA and the beneficiary businesses.
- 3.5 The current grant acceptance amount of £208,860 may be increased in the event that additional funds are secured by SYMCA during the current programme up to March 2025, and if additional funds are offered to extend the programme, the grant acceptance process for the appropriate level of grant will be actioned at that time.

4.0 CONTRIBUTION TO COUNCIL PRIORITIES

4.1 The York and North Yorkshire Made Smarter business support service which will be enabled by the grant from DBT will contribute towards:

Economy

- economically sustainable growth that enables people and places to prosper
- new and existing businesses can thrive and grow
- North Yorkshire has a high profile, is influential nationally and receives its fair share of resources

5.0 ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS CONSIDERED

5.1 The alternative would be to decline the grant, which would result in being unable to participate in this innovative Government funded programme across Yorkshire and the Humber. It would leave York and North Yorkshire businesses at a disadvantage compared to those in neighbouring MCA/LEP areas.

6.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 6.1 The total grant funding offer is £208,890 from South Yorkshire Mayoral Combined Authority, using funding from Department for Business and Trade for delivery of the York and North Yorkshire Made Smarter business support service. As mentioned at Section 3.5, it is possible that additional grant may be made available up to the programme end in March 2025. which would increase the number of businesses that can be supported across York and North Yorkshire. The grant acceptance process for any additional grant will be actioned as necessary.
- 6.2 The grant is payable to NYC, as the accountable body for the YNY LEP. Payment of grant will be made quarterly in arrears based on evidence of expenditure, which covers staff salary costs and overheads, and a marketing budget. The delivery of the Made Smarter Business Support service for York and North Yorkshire will be cost neutral.
- 6.3 YNY LEP will administer monitoring and reporting of the grant funded programme activity and will ensure compliance with NYC Finance and Legal requirements.

7.0 LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

7.1 The grant agreement/s proposed by SYMCA have been reviewed by legal services.

8.0 EQUALITIES IMPLICATIONS

8.1 An Equalities Impact Assessment has been completed (Appendix A). No equalities implications have been identified.

9.0 CLIMATE CHANGE IMPLICATIONS

9.1 A Climate Change Impact Assessment has been completed (Appendix B) and no climate change implications have been identified. It should be noted that there may be some indirect positive effects enabled by the business support activities, through working with businesses to help them improve their energy efficiency, reduce energy consumption, and associated costs, and to support them to implement decarbonisation measures contributing to environmental sustainability objectives for delivering the Route Map to Carbon Negative for York and North Yorkshire.

10.0 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

10.1 It is recommended that the grant from South Yorkshire Mayoral Combined Authority, funded by Department for Business and Trade is accepted to enable York and North Yorkshire Growth Hub to offer the specialist Made Smarter business support service up to March 2025 for the benefit of businesses across York and North Yorkshire.

11.0 RECOMMENDATION(S)

It is recommended that the Executive Member for Open to Business following consultation with the Corporate Director of Community Development, the Corporate Director - Resources and the Assistant Chief Executive (Legal and Democratic Services) authorises the acceptance of the grant of £208,860 from South Yorkshire Mayoral Combined Authority (funded by Department for Business and Trade).

North Yorkshire Council Self-Build and Custom Housebuilding Register:
Consultation on Introducing Eligibility Tests and Fees
Report of the Corporate Director of Community Development.

1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To agree, for the purpose of targeted consultation, the draft criteria for inclusion on the Self-build and Custom Housebuilding Register for North Yorkshire.

2.0 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The Self-build and Custom Housebuilding Act 2015 (as Amended) (thereafter referred to as 'the Act') placed a duty on public authorities to keep a register of individuals (including groups of individuals) and associations who wish to acquire serviced plots to bring forward self and custom build housing. This act placed a duty on public authorities to have regard to those registers in carrying out their planning and other functions including housing, regeneration and disposal of land functions.
- 2.2 The Act and the Self-build and Custom Housebuilding Regulations 2016 (as Amended)(thereafter referred to as 'the Regulations') enables local authorities to include up to two optional local eligibility tests; a local connection test and a financial solvency test. Authorities can apply one or both of these tests only where there is strong justification for doing so. The Act also allows the authority to impose a fee to be placed on the Self-build and Custom Housebuilding register (thereafter referred to as 'the register'). The fee is to reflect the costs of administering and maintaining the register and not exceed what is considered cost recovery.
- 2.3 The Act makes provision for the register to be split into two parts, Part 1 and Part 2. Part 1 is the element that would be subject to any eligibility criteria and/or a fee. The local authority has a duty to provide sufficient plots to meet the identified demand on Part 1 of the register. Part 2 is for individuals or groups who either do not meet the eligibility criteria or, if a fee is required, choose not to pay the fee. Part 2 is to assist in the local authority in determining the overall demand for self-build plots in the authority area for the purposes of longer term planning, housing, land disposal and regeneration but do not count towards demand for the purposes of the Act.
- 2.4 The former district authorities have their own respective registers, however following reorganisation; the council must put in place a consolidated register for the whole of North Yorkshire Council area, excluding the two National Parks. This provides the opportunity to re-consider the eligibility criteria and fees for acceptance onto the register.

3.0 THE SELF-BUILD AND CUSTOM HOUSEBUILDING REGISTER

Creating a New Register

3.1 Prior to setting out whether eligibility criteria and fees should be adopted, the report will set out the process for creating a new register. There is no guidance available that sets out the

process for authorities that have gone through reorganisation such as North Yorkshire Council.

- 3.2 It is not a simple process of combining all of the former registers into a single entity as:
 - a) The legacy authorities did not have a singular approach to eligibility criteria or fees (see Table 3.1 below); and
 - b) There is an issue of data protection in that the persons formerly registering for one of the self-build registers did so on the basis of seeking plots in the legacy areas. They have not provided their consent to be on a North Yorkshire wide register.
- 3.3 The table below sets out the position in the legacy areas in terms of the number of entrants on the register, eligibility criteria and fees:

It should be noted that only Harrogate and Scarborough split their registers into Part 1 and Part 2.

- 3.4 For the reasons highlighted above it is therefore proposed to create an entirely new register to cover the North Yorkshire area. This is the full area covered by the council with the exception of the North Yorkshire Moors National Park and the Yorkshire Dales National Park.
- 3.5 The legacy council officers responsible for the individual registers will in due course write to those persons on their respective registers. Instructions will be provided on how to reregister for the new self-build and custom housebuilding register. If existing entrants do not respond, they will not be placed on the new register but will remain on the legacy registers until such time they are closed down.
- 3.6 This new register will be set up following the conclusion of the draft consultation and any resulting further changes. Once set up the self-builder will be able to self-serve and input the following required details (not a finalised list):
 - Name and address;
 - Their interest level in self-build;
 - The type of project (eg individual self-build);
 - The preferred location(s) for self-build project;
 - Size of plot;
 - Size of house;

- When they would like to commence;
- Funding arrangements;

The Eligibility Criteria and Fees

3.7 The two options for eligibility criteria are the local connection test and a financial solvency test. The introduction of both of these is considered below.

Local Connection Test

- 3.8 A local connection test is one where an applicant must demonstrate they have one of a number of connections to the area. Previously this would have been a connection to the areas of Harrogate or Scarborough Borough, however, if we were to pursue such a test now this would have to apply to North Yorkshire as a whole.
- 3.9 Consideration has been given to whether a local connection test should be applied in North Yorkshire and the recommendation is that it should be. The reasons for this are set out below:
 - The risk of not adopting a local eligibility criteria is that persons interested in building a
 home will be more likely to have their details entered on multiple registers across the
 region and/or nationally. This would skew demand and potentially result in an overprovision of self-build plots;
 - North Yorkshire is a highly desirable place to live, own a second home or retire to, with house prices in some areas in excess of the regional and national averages and subsequently high levels of affordable housing need;
 - Areas including Whitby and Filey have high levels of second home and holiday let ownership and a local connection test would go some way to ensure those persons building self-build units are not exacerbating this issue;
 - Housing land is a finite resource and the in the first instance the council should seek to meet the needs of the local population.
- 3.10 It is proposed that a local connection³ would be established by way of meeting one or more of the following criteria:
 - An applicant currently lives in North Yorkshire and has done so for at least three consecutive years:
 - An applicant has previously lived in North Yorkshire for a continuous period of three years within the past ten years;
 - An applicant is currently employed in North Yorkshire and has been for the past twelve consecutive months⁴
 - An applicant is currently self-employed, with an ongoing viable venture where work is within North Yorkshire, and has been for the past 12 consecutive months⁵
 - An applicant has close family living in North Yorkshire, who have done so for at least five years, e.g. children, parents, brothers and sisters only.

³ A local connection test must include provision that any person in the service of the regular armed forces of the Crown is deemed to satisfy the test whilst in service and for a period after leaving service equal to the length of the longest of any periods required by the test for a condition to be satisfied. 3.11 As set out in the Regulations, an exception is made for those who are currently serving in the armed forces of the Crown or who were serving in the armed forces of the Crown at any time in the five years preceding their application to the self-build and custom housebuilding register.

Financial Solvency Test

- 3.12 In addition to a local connection test, the Act allows the introduction of measures to assess whether a person applying to be on the register has the financial ability to purchase land. Whilst the Act suggested this would also include the ability to pay for the construction of the house, the Regulations subsequently only referred to the purchasing of a plot. As such any financial solvency test would have to be limited to just the purchasing of the land itself.
- 3.13 Whilst an argument could be made to introduce such a requirement, it does bring with it the complication of handling and checking sensitive financial data; loan details, bank accounts, etc. This brings in a host of data protection matters and the manner in which such data is handled and disposed of. Typically, the number of entrants on Part 1 when eligibility criteria are brought in (as seen with Harrogate and Scarborough Borough Council registers) is limited and the additional work and risks associated with handling sensitive data is not considered justified in this instance.
- 3.14 This is a matter that can be kept under review and if it was considered that a financial solvency criterion was required later, this could be actioned.

Charging a Fee

- 3.15 The Regulations allow Authorities to charge a fee for entry onto the register and a separate annual fee for remaining on the register. Of the legacy authorities, both Harrogate Borough and Scarborough Borough opted to introduce a fee. These were £80 and £50 for entry onto the register with a £25 subsequent annual fee thereafter. The other authorities did not introduce a fee.
- 3.16 It remains the opinion of officers that the adoption of a modest charge to recover reasonable costs is appropriate. These costs to the Council will include determining applications for entry onto the register, maintaining the register and corresponding with entrants on the register.
- 3.17 By being entered onto Part 1 the council take on the role of seeking to deliver sufficient self-build plots to meet identified demand this does not mean that the persons on the register will necessarily receive a plot but numerically the council must seek to deliver sufficient plots to meet demand.
- 3.18 The council propose to provide all entrants on Part 1 a list of potential opportunities for self-build taken from the up to date housing monitoring list on at least an annual basis. This will list sites that have permission for one or a small number of units that have not yet commenced that may be opportunities for self-build. It will also provide details of any larger sites that have specific permission for self-build plots within them⁶. It is not a guarantee that such sites will be available but will provide the opportunity for the self-builder to make connections and seek further information.
- 3.19 In terms of setting a fee, the fees set for registers at Harrogate and Scarborough Borough were set a number of years ago. It is therefore appropriate to set a revised fee and consider

⁶ The former Harrogate Borough Council has 2 strategic sites that would deliver self-build plots in accordance with local plan policy that requires 5% self-build plots on schemes of 500 or more dwellings.

whether an annual fee should be brought in. This needs to be a set fee that is used across all of North Yorkshire.

Setting an Appropriate Fee

- 3.20 A fee for entry on the self-build register has been calculated with input from the council's finance officers. This has been based on the following assumptions:
 - The approximate time taken to administer each new entrant onto Part 1 of the register will be two hours:
 - A list of potential sites that could be utilised for self-build will be produced annually for across all North Yorkshire Council planning area and this will take an officer circa 10 hours. This will be sent to all entrants on Part 1;
 - At least five new self-builders will be registered on Part 1 of the system each year meaning that the costs of providing this list are covered annually by new entrants on the register.
- 3.21 This means that on the basis of five new persons registering on Part 1 their fee will covering the cost of two hours of administration and two hours of the 10 hours budgeted for to produce the list of self-build opportunities. Taking into account the hourly rates provided by the Finance Department and any associated on-costs the proposed fee is set at £123 for entry onto the register. This fee will be re-calculated each year taking into account the council's budget setting guidance.
- 3.22 It is proposed not to charge an ongoing annual fee for entrants to be retained on Part 1 at this time. The costs associated with providing the potential list of sites to all entrants should be adequately funded by new entrants added onto Part 1 of the register each year. When this information and accompanying letters are sent out it will ask whether registrants wish to be removed from the register (or moved to Part 2). There is considered minimal work associated with this element of maintaining the register, however, it is proposed to review the resources required to carry out these tasks by 31 October 2025: the date when the base year starts for self-build registers.
- 3.23 The legacy self-build register from Harrogate Borough included a small number of entrants who opted to pay the fee. These entrants were entered onto Part 1⁷. If these entrants opt to move onto the new register for North Yorkshire, it is proposed that they should not be subject to the £123 fee. They have previously paid under the legacy register and it would be unfair for those entrants to be charged again. Notwithstanding this, if they opt not to move across at this time but seek to join later the fee will apply.
- 3.24 Taking into account the above it is therefore proposed to introduce a local connection test and a £123 fee to join the register.

4.0 CONSULTATION UNDERTAKEN AND RESPONSES

- 4.1 Consultation is the next step. The imposing of eligibility criteria and a fee will be subject to a four-week consultation process. It is proposed that this should be a targeted consultation; there is no requirement to consult all persons on the consultation list or the usual statutory consultees that would have no interest in this subject matter.
- 4.2 It is the intention to write to all individuals and groups that are on any of the legacy self-build registers and all Town and Parish Councils. Where a town or parish council does not exist in Harrogate and Scarborough we will consult with Division Members.

5.0 CONTRIBUTION TO COUNCIL PRIORITIES

- 5.1 Ensuring that opportunities for self-build housing are made available for the local community accords with the ambition under Places and Environment that seeks to ensure we have:
 - Good quality, affordable and sustainable housing that meets the needs of our communities:
- 5.2 It also accords with the priorities:
 - To help maintain housing supply, both market and affordable housing, whilst improving the quality of new homes; and
 - To help meet housing needs, including those of vulnerable households and those with specific needs.
- 5.3 Specific needs can include those persons seeking to build their own home.

6.0 ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS CONSIDERED

- 6.1 The publishing of a self-build and custom housebuilding register is a legislative requirement under the Self-build and Custom Housebuilding Act 2015 (as Amended). There is therefore no alternative to having a register.
- 6.2 The alternative options that can be considered are that North Yorkshire Council do not impose any eligibility criteria or adopt an administrative fee. This has been covered in the Section 3, with reasons set out for why the chosen option has been proposed.

7.0 IMPACT ON OTHER SERVICES/ORGANISATIONS

- 7.1 There are very limited impacts on other services, with the exception of:
 - working with the Communications Team to publish a press release; and
 - ensuring integration with a payment system for the payment of the upfront fee for inclusion on the register.

8.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

8.1 Financial implications are limited in respect of the eligibility criteria and fee. By entering interested parties onto Part 1 of the register, the authority will have to provide updates on the availability of serviced plots. This will be done so through the publication of a list of potential opportunities on a yearly basis. This will be prepared by the planning service within existing resources and the upfront fee will provide cost recovery for the works involved.

9.0 LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

9.1 The maintaining of a register is a legislative requirement under the Self-build and Custom Housebuilding Act 2015 (as Amended). The imposition of eligibility criteria and a fee is optional but legislated for in the aforementioned acts.

10.0 EQUALITIES IMPLICATIONS

10.1 An Equalities Impact Screening assessment has been completed (Appendix 1). This concluded that a full Equalities Impacts Assessment was not required in this instance.

10.2 The imposition of eligibility criteria in respect of a local connection test does not discriminate against any group with protected characteristics. Whilst it limits those that can apply to be on the register to those persons residing or with a connection to North Yorkshire this is considered to be justified as set out in paragraph 3.8 onwards.

11.0 CLIMATE CHANGE IMPLICATIONS

- 11.1 The draft decision to be made by this report is solely in relation to imposing a local connection test and a fee for entry onto the register. It is not about the homes that may be provided via the self-build process.
- 11.2 The imposition of a local connection test is considered sustainable, as this will restrict self-builders to those with a connection to North Yorkshire. Without such a criteria, any person or group could apply to be on the register (countrywide) and deliver what could be a second home.
- 11.3 It is therefore not considered to have any significant climate change implications (see Appendix 2: Climate Change Impact Assessment).

12.0 ICT IMPLICATIONS

12.1 There are not considered any ICT implications. The register itself will be set up within existing systems with links on the website to direct interested parties.

13.0 CONCLUSIONS

- 13.1 The maintaining of a Self-build and Custom Housebuilding Register is a statutory requirement and introduction of local eligibility clauses and/or a fee at the discretion of the local authority. Following consideration, it is proposed to introduce a local connection test and a fee for being entered onto the register.
- 13.2 It is considered that there are no substantial implications associated with adopting a local connection test or applying a fee.

14.0 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 14.1 The report sets out the reasons why the local connection test and the fee are recommended. In brief the local connection test is considered essential to ensure that North Yorkshire Council seek to meet local demands for self-build plots and do not inadvertently exacerbate the increasing issues of second home ownership in certain parts of the county.
- 14.2 The reason for introducing a fee is to recover some of the costs associated with maintaining the register and providing updates on potential self-build opportunities.

15.0 RECOMMENDATION(S)

3.1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

3.1 To request approval from the Assistant Director- Resources following consultation with the Executive Member for Culture, Arts and Housing to authorise submission of an application to Sport England's Swimming Pool Support Fund for swimming pools across North Yorkshire.

2.0 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 Phase #2 of this scheme is designed to support investment into energy saving systems for swimming pools. The £40million capital programme is available to all public swimming pools in the UK and funding will be awarded between £20,000-£1,000,000 per council area.
- 2.2 There are x17 Council owned swimming pools in North Yorkshire, however, the funding process requires both Council and Community/Charity owned swimming pools to form a collective application for each Council area. The application process requires detailed technical building and plant information for each swimming pool and there is stringent criteria guidance that may preclude some swimming pools, the eligibility of each North Yorkshire owned swimming pool is currently being assessed.
- 2.3 It is proposed that an application is submitted for eligible North Yorkshire owned swimming pools and community/charity partner swimming pools before the 17th October 2023 application submission deadline.

3.0 PROPOSAL

3.1 There are x17 Council owned swimming pools in North Yorkshire, however, the funding process requires both Council and community/charity owned swimming pools to form a collective application for each Council area, the table below lists the swimming pools included in the application, those highlighted are Council owned:

- 3.2 It is proposed that an application is submitted for eligible North Yorkshire owned swimming pools and community/charity partner swimming pools, a copy of the application template can be seen in Annex A.
- 3.3 Swimming pools are high energy consuming and with recent exceptional rise in energy costs, the financial impact on each swimming pool is significant. The funding criteria allows up to £1,000,000 per Council area, therefore, the funding request per site is yet to be determined, whilst feasibility work is being carried out, however, we anticipate that the overall value of the application will reach the maximum £1,000,000. The awarding of funds is determined by specific criteria and number of applicants, Sport England expect the scheme to be significantly over-subscribed.
- 3.4 The application process requires a priority order as to which swimming pools are in most need of funding, the assessment will be based on the following factors:
 - Age and condition of swimming pool plant and equipment
 - Financial impact scale of potential savings
 - Location review of swimming pool provision in surrounding area
 - Access number of hours available for public access

The Assistant Director of Culture, Leisure, Archives and Libraries (Community Development) will approve the priority ordering.

3.5 The distribution of funding will need to be agreed with organisations that operate swimming pools on behalf of North Yorkshire Council and community/charity partner organisations.

4.0 CONSULTATION UNDERTAKEN AND RESPONSES

4.1 All operators of council owned swimming pools have been engaged and are in support of the application. Other community/charity swimming pools are also in support of the application.

5.0 ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS CONSIDERED

5.1 There are no alternative options, this is a 'one-off' scheme.

6.0 IMPACT ON OTHER SERVICES/ORGANISATIONS

6.1 Successful application to the scheme, will help reduce the impact of rising energy costs and support the sustainability of swimming pools across North Yorkshire.

6.2 The council's property team will need involvement in any council owned swimming pools that are awarded funding, in terms of design and installation. Depending on the value of any awarded funds, finance and procurement may required to provide support.

7.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 7.1 Potential receipt of up to £1,000,000 grant funding, individual swimming pool funding requests are yet to be determined.
- 7.2 Should the application be successful, the funding will contribute towards the overall financial sustainability of council and community owned pools and will reduce the level of council subsidy.

8.0 LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

- 8.1 At the current time it is understood that grant terms are not available for review, however, should these be issued they will also be reviewed by legal services.
- 8.2 If the application is successful NYC will be required to enter into a Funding Agreement. This agreement will be reviewed by legal services and if any of the terms and conditions present an unacceptable risk for the Council then the grant offer would be declined.
- 8.3 Any agreements entered into with operators will be approved by legal services to ensure compliance with the Procurement and Contract Procedure Rules and the Subsidy Control Act 2022.




