North Yorkshire Council Pest Control Fees

Report of the Assistant Director for Regulation and Harbours

1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To seek approval of North Yorkshire Council Pest Control fees.

2.0 SUMMARY

- 2.1 The pest control service has achieved convergence of legacy district and borough teams and work to harmonise standard operating procedures is ongoing. As part of this work there is a need to harmonise and agree new fees.
- 2.2 The approach to fees, for domestic and business customers, varied significantly under legacy arrangements. Domestic fees (for the majority treatments) were harmonised from April 2024, as an interim improvement. Following successful convergence, we are now able to harmonise all our fees and agree fees for new areas of work within North Yorkshire Council internal market and to Schools through the Council's trading company North Yorkshire Education Services (NYES). Harmonising fees supports the generation of income for the service and provides greater clarity and consistency for all customers.
- 2.3 Education have always formed part of the pest control customer base, currently 71 Schools are under contract with NYC pest control (forecast income £27k). This is a great opportunity to expand the customer base with Schools. Because NYES have excellent marketing information, analytics, and business intelligence we will be able to grow the service in a measured manner ensuring resources can meet demand and maintain quality.
- 2.4 NYES provide services to over 500 Schools. Using the NYES brand, which is trusted by Schools, taking full advantage of their customer relations, marketing, and back-office functions NYC pest Control, branded as NYES pest control, hope to capitalise on the pest control opportunities accessible via their customer base. Initially, the service will use its existing capacity, only expanding the staff resources if a business case justifies the growth.

3.0 BACKGROUND

- 3.1 A discretionary pest control service operated across four of the former North Yorkshire localities:
 - Harrogate
 - Richmondshire
 - Hambleton
 - Ryedale
- 3.2 The services delivered to customers included a domestic, business, and internal pest control offer. The officers carry out investigations, identifying pests, establishing where pests are coming from/into properties/premises, selecting appropriate control methods,

- collecting, and disposing of dead/captured pests, laying poisons/traps, spraying chemicals to eliminate insects and providing expert advice.
- 3.3 There is no doubt that this is a service that businesses and the public value, trusting North Yorkshire Council as a reliable, credible brand. NYES is seen in the same way by the education sector.

4.0 INCOME STREAMS

- 4.1 The fees proposed aim to recognise the complexity of the market based on the nature of the business and volume of work per customer for example, a domestic property, B&B, takeaway is vastly different to a School or a large agricultural premises such as a large pig farm. The proposed fees also consider the competition, where the service places itself in the market and how it intends to expand. However, in simple terms the pest control service has two key income streams: Ad hoc jobs and contract work.
- 4.2 Ad hoc jobs come from customers, (business and domestic) that request a treatment as and when they need one. Currently, all business and educational work comes in through the Customer Contact Centre over the phone or via email, often to individual officers making it difficult to capture the business intelligence. Work is ongoing, with Customer, to improve the customer journey through the Customer Contact Centre.
- 4.3 NYES will use their existing customer platform, which Schools are familiar with. NYES will manage and administer billing and charging and customer relations. This will provide for an efficient and excellent customer service.
- 4.4 The aim of the service is to be visible and easily accessible to all the markets available to maximise the income opportunity. Any additional capacity needed by the service will be evidenced by a costed business case. Currently, there is capacity in the service to meet the expected steady increase in demand.

5.0 CURRENT AND PROPOSED FEE STRUCTURES

- 5.1 2023/24 harmonisation of fees only included the most common domestic treatments undertaken. Each locality has continued to offer different services and treatments (to retain the income stream). This report will see all treatments for the domestic, business, Schools and NYC internal markets harmonised.
- 5.2 The fees would go live in April 2025, in accord with the Council's annual budget cycle, except Schools which would take immediate effect to ensure they are implemented in time for School budget planning cycles.
- 5.3 Ad-hoc / domestic customers can access a wide range of services (see Appendix A) priced competitively all achieving full cost recovery and a small surplus. The ad-hoc price applies to domestic customers, businesses, and the NYC internal market.
- 5.4 Concessions for domestic customers only include a harmonised concession set at 25% of the treatment fee subject to evidence of receipt of a government means tested benefit. This is managed by Customer (at point of payment).
- 5.5 For Schools/NYES there are three levels of service available: Standard or Advanced treatment or Comprehensive, which is an annual contract.
- 5.6 Standard treatment for the pests listed below:
 - Wasps
 - Rodents
 - Woodlice

- Ants
- Beetles
- Earwigs
- Silverfish
- Moths
- 5.7 Advanced treatment for more complex expensive to treat pests listed below:
 - Fleas
 - Pest survey
 - Custer Flies
 - Cockroaches
 - Moles
 - Proofing survey
 - Other
 - Grey Squirrels
- 5.8 Comprehensive offers a 12-month contract which provides six visits a year focusing on the high-risk areas for rodent control including kitchen/food storage/preparation area, bin area. The pest control officers will advise if they consider wider areas need covering or additional preventative measures would benefit due to size and scale. This upselling will increase the basic contract price to reflect the additional work and product needed to meet the customers specifications.
- 5.9 Business Offer there are two types of business contract available, Standard and Time and Materials.
- 5.10 Standard Business Contract is a 12-month contract based on six visits a year, the target is SMEs such as takeaways, restaurants, food preparation or other businesses that want the reassurance of a contracted service to protect their business. This basic offer focuses on the businesses high-risk areas for rodent control including kitchen/food storage/preparation area, bin area, storage to help businesses be compliant with industry standards such as Red Tractor Certification. The pest control officers will advise the business if they consider wider areas need covering or additional preventative measures would benefit the business. Upselling will increase the basic contract price to reflect the additional work and product needed to meet the customers specifications.
- 5.11 Time and Materials Contract this is used for the large or more complex businesses examples are: A large pig farm or a large chicken farm where rodent and other infestations occur simultaneously and sporadically but they also need to provide the relevant documentation for industry standards and requirements such as Red Tractor. The business will be charged at the contracted hourly rate plus 10% on all materials used.
- 5.12 NY Internal Market where a contract is required, it will be agreed with the commissioning service if a Standard Business or Time and Material is more appropriate.

6.0 CURRENT AND PROJECTED INCOME

6.1 The quarter three budget projection is currently being prepared by Finance in accord with the Council's budget cycle, working with the service, and an update will be provided at the meeting.

7.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

7.1 NYES will charge NYC pest control service a fixed fee £3,500 per year until March 2026 (£7,000 in total for the period 2024/25 and 2025/26), whereupon the fee will be reviewed based on the volume of work coming to pest control via NYES. This is based upon the work

- already undertaken (at risk) by NYES to develop the pest control offer (marketing material and preparation) and the customer offer (see above) this is considered value for money.
- 7.2 The fees proposed follow the model approved last year by increasing to the highest prices for ad-hoc treatments, albeit some prices have been adjusted to reduce the number of treatments offered to be more comparable with the open pest control market. The basic contract price is based on full cost recovery to get the service 'through the door,' then upsell services to meet the specific customers' needs as identified by the customer / recommended by the pest control professional. The current forecast in 24/25 is for an underachievement of income of around £50k in 24/25. Work is currently being undertaken to improve the ordering/reporting process and harmonise systems. The budget overall for 25/26 for pest control income is around £640k, which includes an additional £50k compared to the 2024/25 budget to reflect the planned improvement and expansion of the service.

8.0 LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

8.1 Pest Control is a discretionary service meaning the Council has the power but not a duty to provide Pest Control Services. The Council can set a fee level that allows it to cover the cost of providing the service.

9.0 EQUALITIES IMPLICATIONS

9.1 An Equalities Impact Assessment has been completed and concessionary reduction for domestic treatment has been harmonised (see Appendix B).

10.0 CLIMATE CHANGE IMPLICATIONS

10.1 There are no climate change implications arising from the fee proposals. (see Appendix C).

11.0 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

11.1 To harmonise fees and agree fees for new areas of work within North Yorkshire Council internal market and to Schools through the Council's trading company North Yorkshire Education Services (NYES). Harmonising fees supports the generation of income for the service and provides greater clarity and consistency for all customers.

12.0 RECOMMENDATION

- 12.1 That the Corporate Director of Environment, in consultation with the Executive Member for Manging Our Environment, approves:
 - i. North Yorkshire Council Pest Control Fees, contained in in Appendix A, attached to this report
 - ii. the fees, in Appendix A attached to this report, be implemented for financial year 2025/26, except fees charged to schools
 - iii. fees charged to Schools to commence with immediate effect, subject to approval of this report
 - iv. an annual fee of £3,500.00 be paid by North Yorkshire Council Pest Control Service to North Yorkshire Education Service, until March 2026.

Grant Acceptance for Beyond Nature Partnership Agreement with Yorkshire Water

Report of the Assistant Director – Environmental Services

1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 That the Assistant Director for Resources authorises the acceptance of the grant in the sum of £324,956.

2.0 BACKGROUND

2.1 The Nidderdale National Landscape (NNL) team delivers habitat conservation across the National Landscape. An important aspect of this is working closely with farmers and landowners to help them deliver environmental enhancements on their land. Yorkshire Water owns 12% of the land in the National Landscape and, as such, is one of the largest landowners in NNL. The NNL team has worked closely with Yorkshire Water for many years. In 2020, Yorkshire Water recognised the importance of their partnership with the NNL team and agreed to provide funding towards a new Beyond Nature Farming Officer role in the NNL team for the period to March 2025. The partnership is considered successful by both parties and we have jointly negotiated a new partnership agreement that will continue to fund the NNL Beyond Nature Officer role for a further 5 years.

3.0 DETAIL OF PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT WITH YORKSHIRE WATER

- 3.1 The grant funds 100% of the cost of the 1 FTE NNL Beyond Nature Farming Officer over a 5-year period. The role of the Beyond Nature Farming Officer is to consolidate environmental management practices on existing Beyond Nature farms and to expand Beyond Nature to new Yorkshire Water farm tenants. This involves:
 - Delivery of one-to-one farm conservation advice to Beyond Nature farmers
 - Overseeing applications for agri environment grants, including opportunities emerging as part of the new ELM schemes, and other business and environmental grants
 - Assist in developing enhanced land management plans based on natural capital and ecosystem service delivery assessments for existing and emerging Beyond Nature farms
 - Supporting conservation delivery works on the ground through identifying requirements, programming, work specifications for and liaison with contractors, in conjunction with Yorkshire Water staff and capital processes
 - Organising conservation training and knowledge-exchange events for Beyond Nature Network members
 - Facilitating business planning to increase resilience and manage change
 - Undertaking farm carbon, soil & nutrient analysis and reviews

4.0 ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS CONSIDERED

4.1 No alternatives have been considered as this funding provides a clear mechanism to fully-fund the Beyond Nature Farming Officer role, who delivers an important part of the NNL team's work. No alternative sources of funding are available and if the grant was not accepted then it would not be possible to continue this role and the valuable conservation work it delivers.

5.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

5.1 The grant will fund 100% of the costs of the NNL Beyond Nature Farming Officer, including estimated travel and subsistence, plus make a contribution to wider management costs across the NNL team. The role is NYC Grade JK and the post is 1FTE. The grant period will start in April 2025 to provide a continuous period of grant from the previous grant funding, enabling staff continuity. The contribution from Yorkshire Water is fixed and has been calculated to cover an annual pay and cost inflation rate of 3% throughout the period and standard progression on pay increments. Should staff costs be slightly higher than anticipated then there will be a slightly lower contribution to wider management costs, whereas if staff costs are slightly lower than anticipated then there will be a slightly higher contribution to the wider management costs.

5.2 The partnership agreement has been reviewed and approved by finance.

6.0 LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

6.1 The partnership agreement has been reviewed and approved by legal services (Jonathan Finn).

7.0 EQUALITIES IMPLICATIONS

7.1 There are no impacts on people with any protected characteristics.

8.0 CLIMATE CHANGE IMPLICATIONS

8.1 The role assists Yorkshire Water farm tenants in the National Landscape to deliver environmental enhancements on their tenant farms in partnership with Yorkshire Water (as the landowner), which have positive environmental benefits in terms of decreasing greenhouse gas emissions, improving climate resilience and enhancing biodiversity.

9.0 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 9.1 Authorisation to accept the grant offer from Yorkshire Water is recommended because:
 - It will allow continuation of the existing partnership delivery approach between the NNL team and Yorkshire Water.
 - It will fund 100% of the costs of the Beyond Nature Farming Officer role.

• It will enable the on-going delivery of farm conservation on Yorkshire Water farm holdings in Nidderdale National Landscape, which is a key strategic priority as identified in our Management Plan.

10.0 RECOMMENDATION(S)

10.1 That the Assistant Director – Resources approve the acceptance of the grant of £324,956 from Yorkshire Water.
