APPROVAL TO ACCEPT AN OFFER OF GRANT FUNDING – UP TO £325,000

Report of the Assistant Director – Children and Families Service

1.0 PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

- 1.1 To recommend that the Executive Member for Children and Families, in consultation with the Chief Finance Officer, and the Executive Member for Finance authorises the acceptance of an offer of grant funding from the Department for Education's 'Sector Led Improvement Partner (SLIP)' Programme up to a sum of £325,000.

2.0 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The current Department for Education (DfE) SLIP Programme, of which NYC are a lead partner LA, ends on the 31st March 2024.
- 2.2 Sector-led improvement is about local authorities supporting each other to improve their children's services. The programme aims to improve the overall performance of children's social care by using the strongest performing local authorities to provide peer support to authorities who are working to improve their services. Sector led improvement support can be accessed by any local authority rated as inadequate or requires improvement, or by local authorities rated as good, where there is significant evidence of a decline in performance.
- 2.3 In September 2023, the DfE announced funding for a further SLIP Programme which will run during 2024-2025. As this is under a new DfE grant funding opportunity NYC would need to put in a competitive bid to become a Lead Partner under the new Programme.
- 2.4 On 17th October 2023, NYC received approval to apply for grant funding up to £350,000 from the Executive Member for Children and Families and Assistant Director- Resources. (The figure of £350,000 was a maximum figure of funding that NYC would seek to apply for, in the absence of DfE funding criteria having been released).
- 2.5 The DfE deadline for bids to be submitted was 1st November 2023, and NYC's bid was submitted in advance of this.
- 2.6 On 21st December 2023, the DfE wrote to NYC to confirm writing to confirm that this bid has been successful, and they will work with NYC to confirm the final amount of grant funding in February-March 2024 (up to a total of £325,000).

3.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 3.1 The DfE bid criteria required each local authority to provide a figure for a minimum funding bid, and a maximum funding bid.
- 3.2 Upon receiving the DfE's funding criteria for 2024/2025 NYC have calculated and since submitted a final funding figure for a minimum of £303,500 and a maximum for £325,000.
- 3.3 If it is approved that NYC can accept this grant funding, the maximum funding that would be received would be £325,000.
- 3.4 The bid figure is in line with the level of delivery and funding NYC has undertaken each year under the current SLIP Programme, which we can evidence has been manageable in terms of resources and capacity to deliver the Programme and attain the associated funding required to cover costs and contribute to wider council benefits.
- 3.5 The DfE have confirmed the Programme will be funded by a Section 14 Grant.

4.0 LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

- 4.1 The DfE terms and conditions have been reviewed by legal services

5.0 IMPACT ON OTHER SERVICES/ORGANISATIONS

- 5.1 The purpose of this report is to seek approval to accept an offer of grant funding from the DfE.
- 5.2 NYC's participation will be to support local authorities external to North Yorkshire and therefore there will not be any impact on North Yorkshire service provision.

6.0 EQUALITIES IMPLICATIONS

- 6.1 There are no direct equalities implications arising from this report. Consideration for equalities issues have been undertaken within the scoping for grant application and acceptance, in addition to adhering to any terms and conditions imposed by funding bodies. The Equalities Impact Screening Form has been appended to this report.

7.0 CLIMATE CHANGE IMPLICATIONS

- 7.1 There are no direct climate change implications arising from this report. Consideration for climate change issues have been undertaken within the scoping for grant application and acceptance, in addition to adhering to any terms and conditions imposed by funding bodies. The Climate Change Impact Assessment Form has been appended to this report.

8.0 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 8.1 Reputationally, participation in the SLIP Programme as a Lead Partner has resulted in extremely positive feedback by DfE colleagues who see NYC as a credible and

trustworthy partners

- 8.2 Financially, participation has enabled NYC to use any variance in funding to secure additional resource capacity and training, to support internal improvements, and this would be expected to continue if able to participate through 2024-25.

9.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 9.1 The Executive Member for Children and Families in consultation with the Chief Finance Officer and the Executive Member for Finance authorises the acceptance of grant funding of up to £325,000 from the DfE under the Sector Led Improvement Partner Programme.

What are you proposing to do?	To apply for approval to accept grant funding to cover the costs of NYC participation in the DfE's Sector Led Improvement Programme 2024-2025. This would enable NYC to continue to be a DfE lead partner who would provide support to eligible local authorities who require support to improve their children's services. This would require NYC to work with other LAs to understand what priority areas they want to improve in their own authority and to scope work accordingly to help them to move toward understanding the changes they would want to take forward. This would be undertaken via meetings (mostly online with occasional face to face/site visits if this was the only way to facilitate a session).
Why are you proposing this? What are the desired outcomes?	The desired outcome is to successfully apply for approval to accept funding to cover the required programme costs and ensure NYC can deliver the programme with no financial detriment.
Does the proposal involve a significant commitment or removal of resources? Please give details.	The proposal requires a time commitment from existing NYC employees, pre-agreed with line managers. A total of between 160 - 180 working days commitment.

Title of proposal	To apply for approval to accept grant funding under the Department for Education's 'Sector Led Improvement Programme' 2024-2025
Brief description of proposal	<p>To seek approval to accept grant funding from the Department for Education (DfE) to participate in, and to cover the associated programme costs of, the DfE's Sector Led Improvement Programme (SLIP) 2024-2025. NYC have been a DfE SLIP Lead authority under the current SLIP programme for over 2 years, which is a programme set up to provide short packages of advice and support from Good our Outstanding LAs into LAs who require support to improve their children's services.</p> <p>NYC received approval to apply for funding through North Yorkshire Council's grant approval process in October 2023, and subsequently submitted a bid to the Department for Education for up to £330,000 of funding.</p> <p>If NYC are approved to be part of the next Programme by the DfE this would mean NYC will work with eligible LAs to understand and scope priority areas they want to improve in their own authority. NYC would then work to develop a joint plan with agreed activities and meetings required to support them to achieve this.</p> <p>This work would be undertaken via meetings with individual LA colleagues of which the vast majority of are online (over 90% for the current programme) with occasional face to face/site visits if work cannot be undertaken virtually. At the point of starting the Programme NYC would not know which LAs would be eligible and therefore it is not known who we would be working with, to reasonably estimate any impact on travel arrangements. However, as noted, the main option is to seek virtual sessions, and minimise any need for travel by car or by public transport.</p> <p>This Impact Assessment is to accompany an application to seek approval to apply for grant funding to become part of this Programme for 2024/2025.</p>
