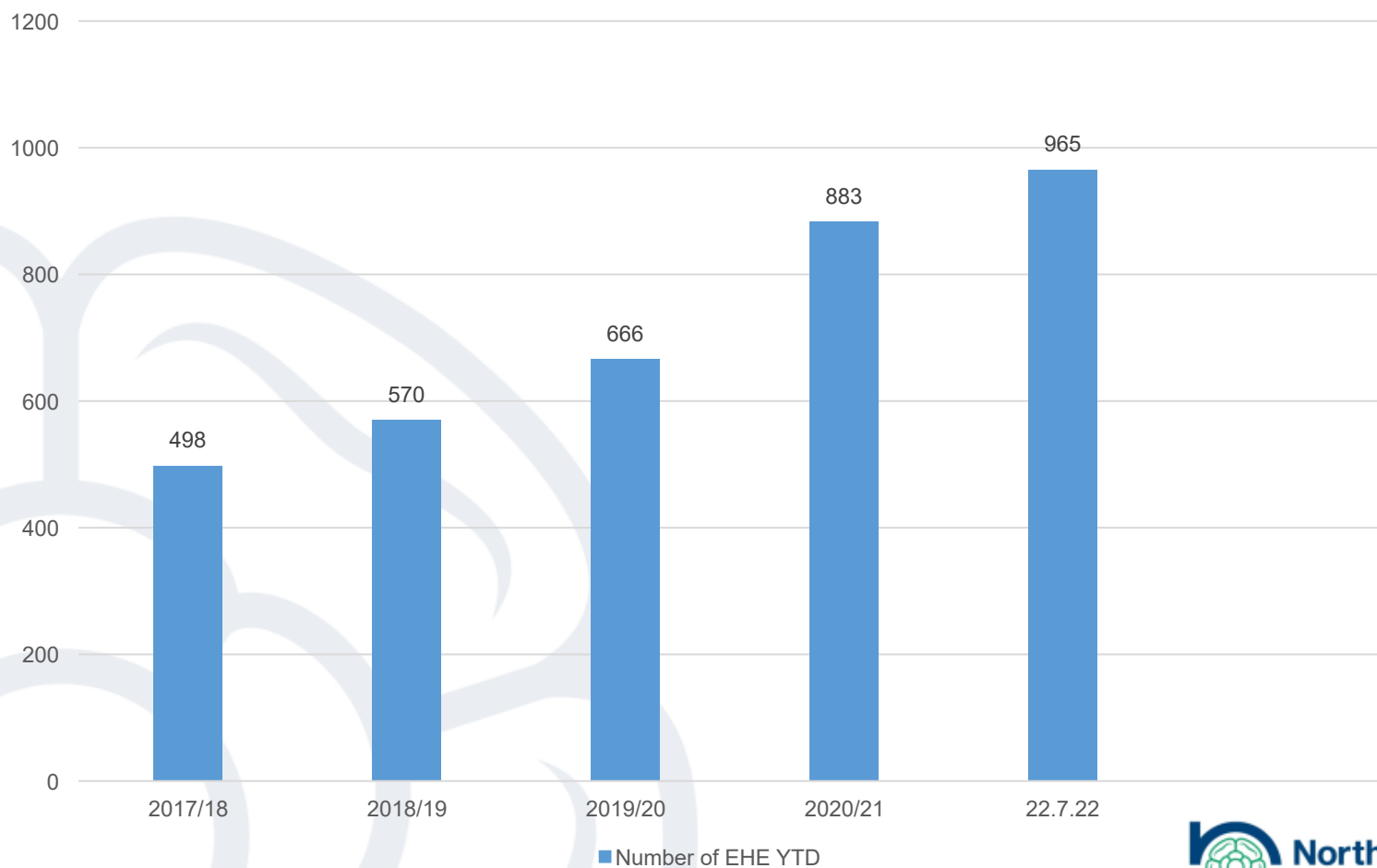

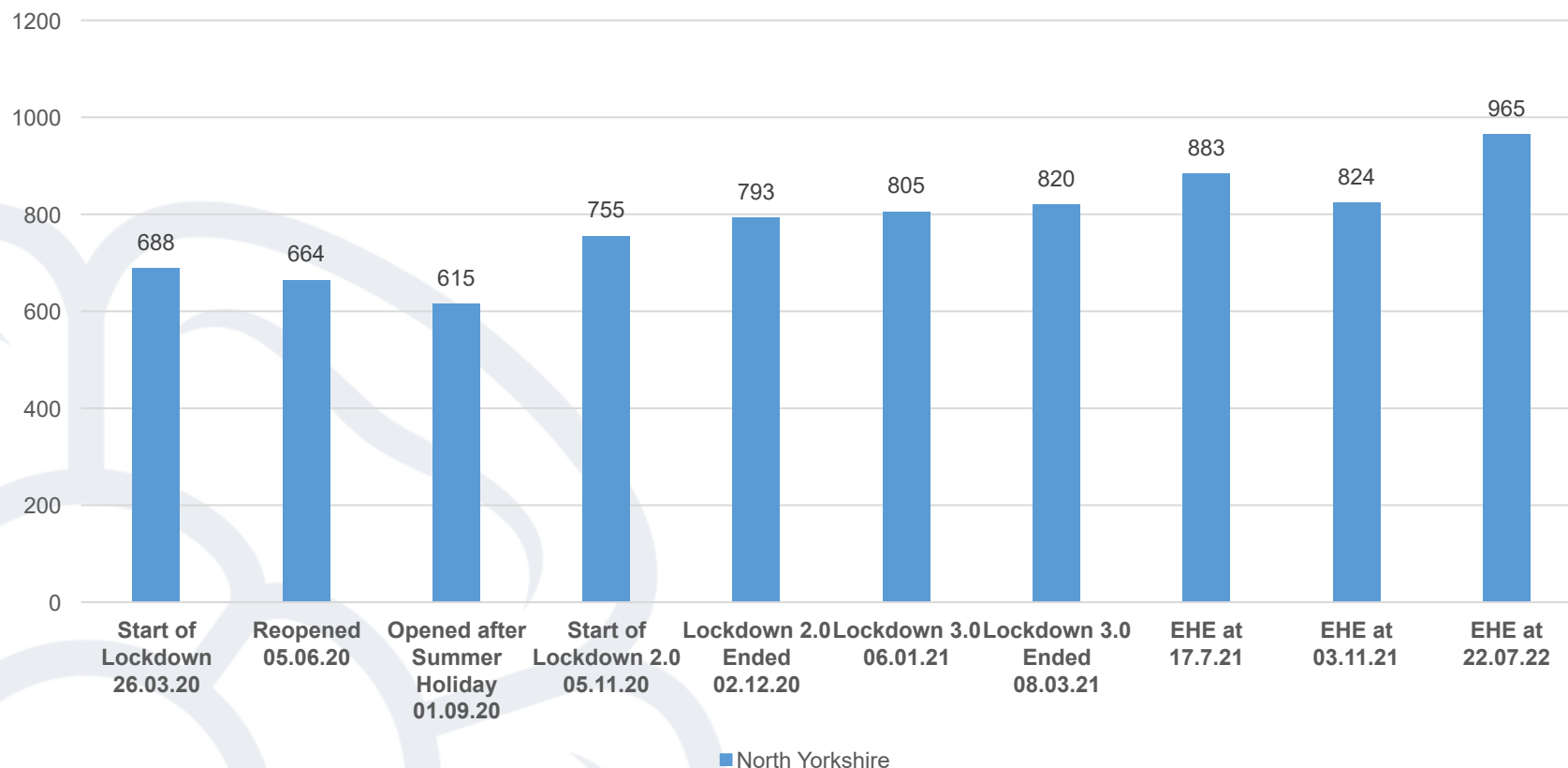

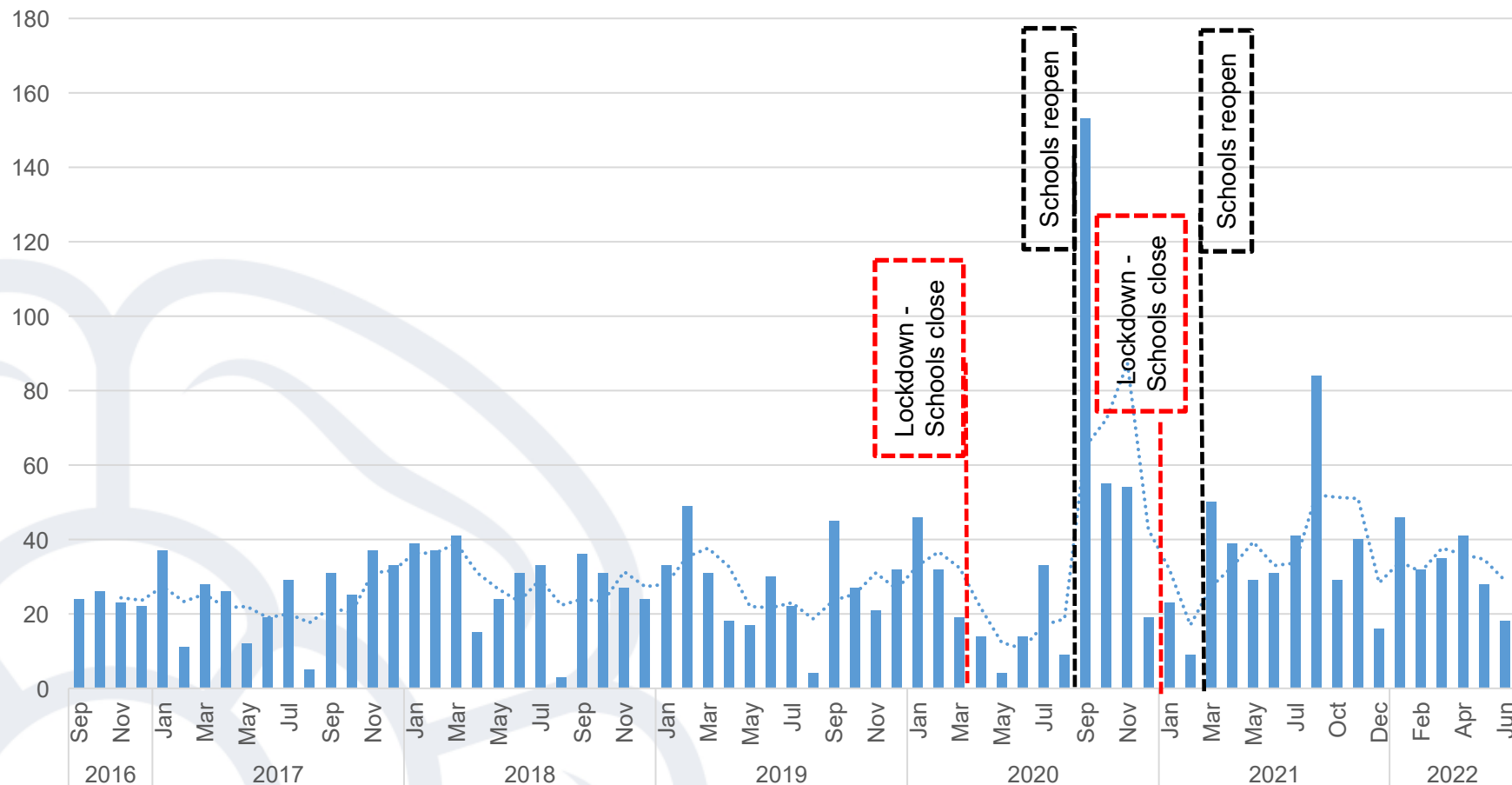


Impact of Covid-19

Number of children EHE

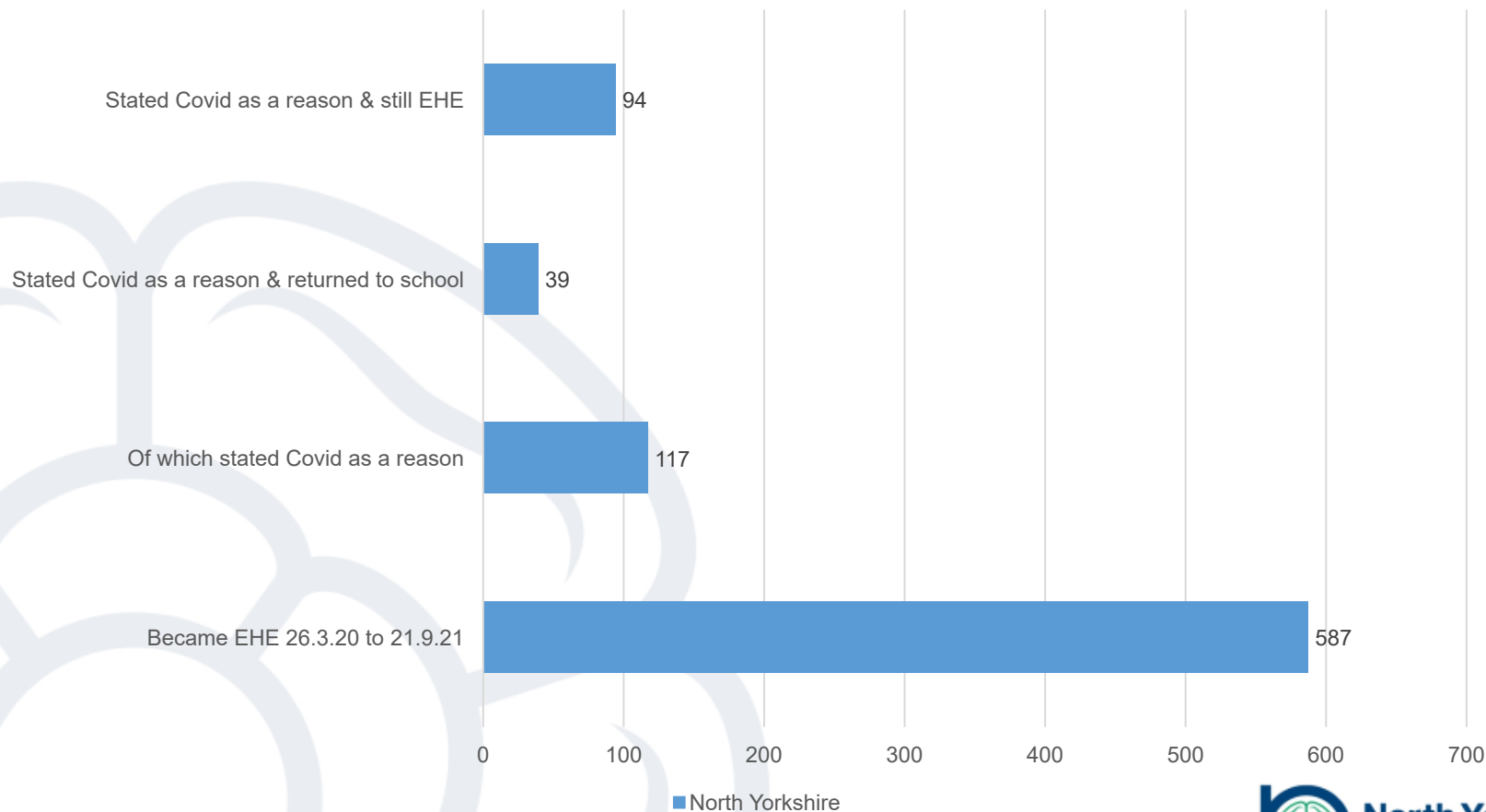


Pupils becoming EHE Trend – 2016 to present

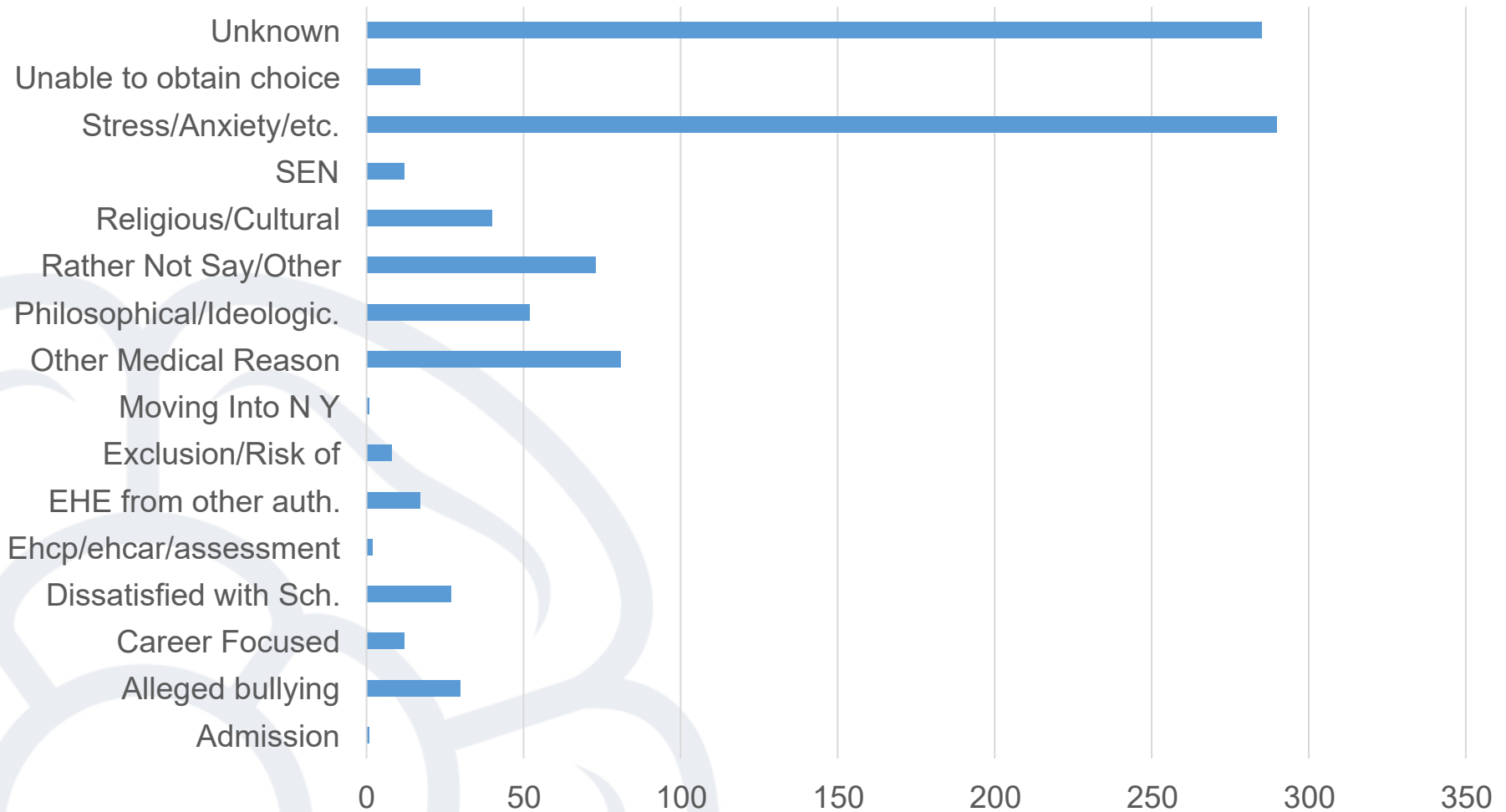


Became EHE due to Covid-19

EHE Advisors

- Working with schools to encourage pre-decision meetings, challenging any schools who are not informing the LA prior to a parent choosing to EHE
- Ensuring parents/carers have an informed understanding of EHE prior to them making a final decision
- Working with parents/carers who are currently EHE but now want children to return to school to support them through the admissions process
- Working with parents/carers who are not providing a suitable education to ensure they understand why it is not suitable, where the education remains unsuitable the EHE advisors are now at the stage where are serving a section 437 which is a legal first notice which places a legal duty on parents/carers to provide a suitable education. If this does not happen it may result in a School Attendance Order (SAO) and or Prosecution

Coming up

- EHE advisors now at the stage where they are taking legal action if education is still unsuitable
- The capacity of the EHE team has been increased on a temporary basis of 5 months to allow the team to contact all families who were EHE prior to the EHE team being in place in addition to contacting all new EHE families within 5 working days
- Monitoring the impact of legal intervention
- DfE have announced there will be a register for EHE so parents/carers will have a duty to inform the LA if they EHE
