HNY ICS Test & Learn Pilot Programme (Heath & Youth Justice)

Report of the Corporate Director – Children & Young People's Service

1.0 Purpose of report

1.1 In line with paragraph 6(b) of the Executive Members' Delegation Scheme, the Executive Member for Children's Services is asked to authorise the agreement for NYC to sign up to deliver the Test & Learn Pilot Programme in 2023/2024 and 2024/2025, which will allow the Chief Financial Officer to authorise the participation of NYC in the programme. This will enable the local authority to receive the allocated funding.

2.0 Issues

Humber & North Yorkshire Health & Care Partnership have funded NYC to deliver the Trusted Relationships element of the Test & Learn Pilot programme focussing on Health & Youth Justice.). Each year, the local authority is required to sign up to the programme through an MOU and accept the grant.

3.0 Performance Implications

- 3.1 For each year of the current phase of the programme (2023/24 and 2024/25), the funding is granted to NYC by the payment of a Grant from Tees, Esk & Wear Valley NHS. As a Test & Learn Pilot programme this funding is not dependent on results or pre-determined performance targets. We do submit quarterly data reports based on key non-identifiable demographic indicators, along with monthly narrative Highlight Reports and anonymised Case Studies.
- 3.2 We have been delivering on this programme throughout the 2022/23 financial year. The initial grant allocation was for 2 years. This has now been extended to three years, and will enable us to fully find and retain Trusted Relations through to the end of March 2025.

4.0 Financial Implications

4.1 NYC Grant funding for Trusted Relationships is as follows: 2023/24 = £165.555

2024/25 = £190,136

Total Grant funding to be received = £355,691

5.0 Legal Implications

5.1 The agreement is through the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding, which has been checked and approved by Joanne Barclay (Principal Solicitor). There are no legal implications assigned to it.

6.0 Equalities Implications

An Equalities Impact (EI) assessment has taken place and acceptance of the grant does not result in EI implications. The programme is already operational within the Children & Families service so there is no impact. However, if the funding is not available in the future, the services may reduce. Trusted Relationships offers support to children and young people at risk of criminal exploitation, no matter what their protective characteristics. Interventions are based on need.

7.0 Environmental Impacts/Benefits

7.1 A climate change impact assessment has been completed. The programme has no adverse impact as the programme is already embedded within the Children & Families service, using existing systems and buildings. No changes to services are proposed. Trusted Relationships workers work with children and young people in line with service strategy.

8.0 Reasons For Recommendations

8.1 The programme has been delivered through this Grant since April 2021 as part of what was originally termed Humber Coast & Vale Integrated Care Service. Being fully funded through a grant allocation, the delivery of this work is cost neutral to NYC.
