Reason for decision	<p>The recommendation is to seek approval to consult on the consultation methods employed in all areas of planning. This is not about the actual policies of the local plan or any decisions made on planning applications; it simply sets out how and when the community and other interested parties can become involved in the planning process.</p> <p>Impact on the areas of climate change have been considered and the supporting of new engagement technologies going forward could have a positive impact on climate change by relying more on email and online capabilities for consultation and less so on the more traditional methods of communication; letter and postage. However, there remains a need to ensure all interested persons and groups are engaged with in a manner that is inclusive – and some protected groups struggle with non-written means of communication.</p> <p>Advice has been sought from the Climate Change team on the limited potential to increase greenhouse gas emissions from the involvement of local communities in engagement and planning meetings. It is advised that a full CCIA is not required as there are opportunities to mitigate greenhouse gas emissions. Wherever possible, opportunities will be sought to hold planning meetings and engagement events in accessible locations, close to communities and accessible by foot/cycle/public transport.</p> <p>With this in mind, the impacts on climate change are therefore considered to be minor in nature, however, the level of communication by different means; email,</p>			

	social media, post, should be monitored to understand if there is a shift towards more sustainable means of communication and engagement.
