Sport England Swimming Pool Support Fund

Report of the Corporate Director Nic Harne.

1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To request approval from the Assistant Director- Resources following consultation with the Executive Member for Culture, Arts and Housing to authorise submission of an application to Sport England's Swimming Pool Support Fund for swimming pools across North Yorkshire.

2.0 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 Sport England have designed a grant scheme to support swimming pools that continue to be affected by significant rises in utility costs and swimming pool chemical costs. In phase 1 of the scheme, £20million is available to support swimming pools that are at risk of closure or have had to significantly reduce their service provision. Phase 2 of the scheme, includes £40million for capital investment into energy saving systems.
- 2.2 Phase 1 of the scheme is now open and the application submission window is 4th -11th August, funding will be awarded between £10,000 £500,000 as a whole (per authority) and decisions will be confirmed in September 2023.

3.0 PROPOSAL

3.1 There are x17 Council owned swimming pools in North Yorkshire, however, the funding process requires both Council and community/charity owned swimming pools to form a collective application for each Council area, the table below lists the swimming pools included in the application, those highlighted are Council owned:

- 3.2 It is proposed that an application is submitted for all North Yorkshire owned swimming pools and community/charity partner swimming pools, a sample of the application template can be seen in Annex A.
- 3.3 Swimming pools are high energy consuming and with recent exceptional rise in energy costs, the financial impact on each swimming pool is significant. The funding criteria allows up to £500,000 per Council area, therefore, it is anticipated that the funding request per site will be £26,315 (x19 swimming pools). The awarding of funds is determined by specific criteria and number of applicants, Sport England expect the scheme to be significantly over-subscribed.
- 3.4 The application process requires a priority order as to which swimming pools are in most need of funding, the assessment will be based on the following factors:
 - Financial impact total increased costs
 - Location review of swimming pool provision in surrounding area
 - > Access number of hours available for public access

The Assistant Director of Culture, Leisure, Archives and Libraries (Community Development) will approve the priority ordering.

3.5 The distribution of funding will need to be agreed with organisations that operate swimming pools on behalf of North Yorkshire Council and community/charity partner organisations.

4.0 CONSULTATION UNDERTAKEN AND RESPONSES

4.1 All operators of council owned swimming pools have been engaged and are in support of the application. Other community/charity swimming pools are also in support of the application.

5.0 ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS CONSIDERED

5.1 There are no alternative options, this is a 'one-off' scheme.

6.0 IMPACT ON OTHER SERVICES/ORGANISATIONS

6.1 Successful application to the scheme, will help reduce the impact of rising energy costs and support the sustainability of swimming pools across North Yorkshire.

7.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 7.1 Potential receipt of up to £500,000 grant funding based on £26,315 per site.
- 7.2 Should the application be successful, the funding will contribute towards the overall financial sustainability of council and community owned pools and will reduce the level of council subsidy.

8.0 LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

8.1 At the current time it is understood that grant terms are not available for review, however, should these be issued they will also be reviewed by legal services.

- 8.2 If the application is successful NYC will be required to enter into a Funding Agreement. This agreement will be reviewed by legal services and if any of the terms and conditions present an unacceptable risk for the Council then the grant offer would be declined.
- 8.3 Any agreements entered into with operators will be approved by legal services to ensure compliance with the Procurement and Contract Procedure Rules and the Subsidy Control Act 2022.

9.0 **EQUALITIES IMPLICATIONS**

Fund Objectives

The purpose and objective of the SPSF Phase I revenue funding is to support the survival of public sector swimming pools facing increased operating costs and thereby protect the wider health outcomes, economic and lifesaving water safety benefits they provide.

The objectives of the SPSF are to:

- Minimise the reduction of viable swimming pool provision or significant service reduction within local authority areas, targeting sites most vulnerable to closure, in order to maintain levels of viable swimming provision at current levels.
- Prevent gaps in public leisure provision emerging, maintaining the percentage of people living within 20 minutes' drive of a public swimming pool at the same level.
- Prioritise support in those areas of greatest socio-economic need (as evidenced by deprivation), where all other factors are equal.
- Encourage the leisure sector to transition to a position of environmental and financial sustainability, increasing the number of local authorities with a strategic plan for leisure and active wellbeing, aligned with the upcoming Sport Strategy. The investment is intended to ensure that swimming pools that receive support from SPSF maintain the facility and the service for a fixed period of time.


