Sport England Swimming Pool Support Fund – Phase 2

Report of the Corporate Director (Community Development)

1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To recommend that the Executive Member for Culture, Arts and Housing following consultation with the Assistant Director Resources and Executive Member for Finance authorises the acceptance of the grant offer of £288,186 for Sport England's Swimming Pool Support Fund for swimming pools across North Yorkshire.

2.0 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 Phase #2 of the Fund was designed to support investment into energy saving systems for swimming pools. A £40million capital programme was available to all public swimming pools in the UK and funding was awarded between £20,000-£1,000,000 per council area.
- 2.2 There are x17 Council owned swimming pools in North Yorkshire, however, the funding process required both Council and Community/Charity owned swimming pools to form a collective application for each Council area. The application process required detailed technical building and plant information for each swimming pool following stringent criteria guidance.
- 2.3 An application was submitted for eligible North Yorkshire owned swimming pools and community/charity partner swimming pools.

3.0 OUTCOME

3.1 The funding scheme was significantly over-subscribed with 700 swimming pools applying for funding throughout England. x4 swimming pools in North Yorkshire were awarded funding, totalling £288,186, see below:

3.2 Selby Leisure Centre is the only NYC owned swimming pool to receive funding, the other x3 swimming pools are community swimming pools that are managed independently.

4.0 CONSULTATION UNDERTAKEN AND RESPONSES

4.1 Selby Leisure Centre is owned by North Yorkshire Council and is currently managed by Inspiring Healthy Lifestyles (IHL). The Sport and Active Wellbeing Service will work with Property and IHL to plan delivery of the project. The other community/charity swimming pools have been notified of their grant award and each are happy to accept the funding.

5.0 ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS CONSIDERED

5.1 There are no alternative options, this is a 'one-off' scheme.

6.0 IMPACT ON OTHER SERVICES/ORGANISATIONS

- 6.1 Delivery of these energy saving interventions will help reduce the impact of rising energy costs and support the sustainability of swimming pools across North Yorkshire.
- 6.2 The Council's property team will be required to support the project at Selby Leisure Centre, finance and procurement will also be required. The community swimming pools will manage their projects independently.

7.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 7.1 Proposed receipt of £288,186 grant funding, to fund works at 4 sites. Arrangements will need to be made to distribute the relevant funding to each community swimming pool operator.
- 7.2 The funding will contribute towards the overall financial sustainability of council and community owned pools and will reduce the level of council subsidy.

8.0 LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

8.1 NYC are required to enter into a Capital Grant Agreement this Agreement has been reviewed by Legal Services. Any expenditure of the Selby Leisure Centre grant will be in accordance with the Council's Procurement and Contract Procedure Rules.

9.0 EQUALITIES IMPLICATIONS

9.1 Equality Impact Assessment was carried out as part of the application process, no implications were identified, see Appendix A.

10.0 CLIMATE CHANGE IMPLICATIONS

10.1 Climate Change Impact Assessment was carried out as part of the application process, the energy saving interventions included in the scheme provide a carbon saving, see Appendix B.

- 11.1 To support the financial sustainability of swimming pool provision for residents across North Yorkshire.
- 11.2 To support the Council's efficiency saving programme.

Phase #2 of this scheme is designed to support investment into energy saving systems for swimming pools. The £40million capital programme is available to all public swimming pools in the UK and funding will be awarded between £20,000-£1,000,000 per council area.

There are x16 Council owned swimming pools in North Yorkshire, however, the funding process requires both Council and Community/Charity owned swimming pools to form a collective application for each Council area. The application process requires detailed technical building and plant information for each swimming pool and there is stringent criteria guidance that may preclude some swimming pools, the eligibility of each North Yorkshire owned swimming pool is currently being assessed.

It is proposed that an application is submitted for eligible North Yorkshire owned swimming pools and community/charity partner swimming pools before the 17th October 2023 application submission deadline.

Should the application be successful, the funding will contribute towards the overall financial sustainability of council and community owned pools and will reduce the level of council subsidy.
