




Fostering North Yorkshire

CYPS Scrutiny Committee Update – June 2024

Children living in foster care

- There are more children living in foster care now than we have seen over the last decade (76% of all children in care)
- 7 living in IFA (Independent Fostering Agency) fostering arrangements. Thus, 371 (98.1%) are living in North Yorkshire foster homes
- Overall, more children in a lower number of Fostering Households

 so more multi occupied households etc.








Age profile of children living in foster care

- 10+ relatively stable
- Increases in under 5s and 5-9 year olds








New foster carer approvals

- We have seen a decreasing number of new unrelated carer approvals since the pandemic
- However, more children are living with their families under connected carers temporary approvals and then becoming family and friend foster carers at full approval
- This is in line with our practice model








Age profile of foster carers

- The graph shows all foster carers (i.e. family and friend foster carers and unrelated foster carers)
- 55-59 has always been the largest cohort for both unrelated and family friend carers
- New recruitment needs to drive and increase the numbers of the 45-49 and 50-54 age range to ensure there is enough capacity as the older cohorts retire








Unrelated de registrations

- There is often more de registrations of unrelated foster carers than new approvals coming through yr on yr, this is seen nationally. Often related to changes in families circumstances.
- NY are continuously driving recruitment to increase newly approved carers i.e. golden hello £500 and recommend a friend
- There is a high priority to continue to find foster homes for new children coming into our care who do not have a safe family network








New unrelated enquiries

- Pre pandemic there were approx.
 10-15 enquiries a week
- These numbers reduced during the pandemic to approx. 10 a week
- The ongoing recruitment drive via Social Media ensured work continued
- We saw recovery in Q4 2021/2022 however, numbers plummeted when Russia invaded Ukraine
- HfU families influx gives a boost at the end of 2023 due to dedicated recruitment to those who had been Homes for Ukraine hosts
- Enquiries continue to fluctuate between 0-6 a week








Increasing short term instability

- New admissions into unrelated care can sometimes only be offered a sequence of short term arrangements initially
- There was always a cohort of children for whom it was difficult to find a foster home match – over the last four years this cohort has increased from approx. 10 to 40 (an increase of approx. 3% to 10% of the children living in foster care) – we know children have faced adversity and needs have increased significantly i.e. pandemic








Stable long term stability

- Long term stability improved during the pandemic and has now reverted back to pre pandemic rates
- This means that over 75% of children living in foster homes are in stable long term arrangements which is very positive








Staying put

- Staying put is when a child in care who has become 18 remains living with their former foster carer – it is a great outcome and supports several young adults studying at University or going on into training or employment
- This can reduce the fostering capacity for those families for new children becoming looked after








Strong performance re Health and Dental

- This strong performance is good news for children in care This is a shared responsibility by the fostering service, children's social work teams and health colleagues
- The large dip in performance was during the Lockdowns for the COVID-19 pandemic








Also strong performance re SDQs and

PEPs

 SDQs is 'Strengths and Difficulties Questionnaires' and is a means by which the mental health of children is monitored – the actual questionnaire is completed by the foster carer

 PEPs is 'Personal Education Plans' and this strong performance is very much about the hard work of the virtual school, children's social work team and schools






New logo and colours in 2023















New financial measures in 2023

- More mileage paid (carers can now claim the first 100 miles)
- A bridging payment for when a carer doesn't have a child for three weeks
- Foster carers can sign up to the Council's employee benefits scheme which includes discounts at supermarkets and leisure activities
- Recommend a friend payment of £500
- Golden hello payment for newly approved carers of £500 extended to December 2024
- April 2024 payment uplift returned to the usual formula of the rate of CPI the previous December (i.e. December 2023) and this year was 4%
