The proposal is for the transfer of NYC's land, known as the former Northallerton School and Sixth From College on Grammar School Lane, Northallerton, to the Department for Education or another nominated government department. This transfer will see the DFE investing £15m into the delivery of a new SEN School to cover the Northern region of the County.

Section 2. Why is this being proposed? What are the aims? What does the authority hope to achieve by it? (e.g. to save money, meet increased demand, do things in a better way.)

This transfer is being proposed to unlock the investment in Education in North Yorkshire.

CYPS has established that there is a shortfall in SEN school places in the County. This proposal will see investment in delivering 120 SEN school places for the northern area of the County.

The Council will see a reduced revenue spend as a result of the transfer as it will no longer be funding the management and security of the vacant buildings.

Section 3. What will change? What will be different for customers and/or staff?

Having 120 addition SEN places will assist CYPS to deliver its plan to meet the immediate service delivery need. Once the facility is operational this facility will deliver education services to children who need the additional support provided by a school of this nature. It will have a direct benefit to the education of children in the northern area of North Yorkshire.

No public consultation has taken place.

In due course, as the proposals advance, planning consent will be required for elements of the project and the usual planning consultation will take place.

This proposal will see investment of £15m into educational services in North Yorkshire.

The transfer of NYC's land at Grammar School Lane will have a positive impact on the education of those children that require SEN provision.

By increasing the provision, North Yorkshire will benefit from 120 additional SEN places via £15m in investment into this new facility.

The Council will benefit from revenue savings associated with managing a vacant building and a positive impact on the revenue costs associated with SEN provision.

The proposal will have a positive impact on some groups of people with protected characteristics as detailed above.
